A TRIBUTE TO PROF. E. A. HUPPERT

BY AN

APPRECIATIVE MEMBER OF THE FACULTY



The third member of Northeast's faculty to be lost by death is Prof. E. A. Huppert, who died last March 10, after a prolonged illness which compelled him to retire from teaching three years ago.

Prof. Huppert experienced a long, interesting and successful career as an artist. As a student he was blessed with the best of preparation in the art academy of Paris, where his natural talent and honest efforts won for him the highest praises and enviable prizes of the Art Institute.

On returning to America, he made rapid progress, both as a teacher and as a portrait and landscape painter. After teaching art in the Liberty Mo., "Ladies' College," he established a popular art school of his own in Kansas City, but closed it in order to accept the position of supervisor of drawing for the Kansas City schools till 1913, when he accepted the position as head of the Art Department of the Northeast High School, which place he filled creditably until forced to retire on account of the illness that finally caused his death.

While serving as director of art and design in our school, he greatly aided the young art editors of the Nor'easter Magazine in producing its illustrations and cover designs.

During Prof. Huppert's long career as teacher and supervisor of drawing and painting, scores of young people and teachers have been successfully started professionally, either as artists for art's sake or as commercial artists.

He was devoted to his beloved profession and should be remembered as one of the pioneer art teachers who aided in establishing in our community and schools an artist's love for the beautiful. Thus to have lived in the memory of his students and friends and thus to be recorded in the history of Kansas City—is not to die. His masterpiece is an ambitious and large painting illustrating a pathetic and dramatic scene in Chateaubriand's romantic story of "Atala," the Indian maiden who committed suicide lest she be tempted to break her oath of virginity by marrying Chactas, a handsome Christian Indian, with whom she had fallen in love.

This painting is owned by the "Jones Dry Goods Company," in whose store it is on exhibition, but should ultimately be preserved in the Kansas City Fine Arts Gallery.

Prof. Huppert was a martyr to his beloved work as a teacher and a producer of art. For him to have scattered along the highway of life artistic creations of beauty for the human eye to gaze upon and to have cultivated in the hearts and minds of a generation of young people real love for the beautiful and an ambition to develop their creative talents along artistic lines—is to be classed among the enviable benefactors of the human race, and to be honored as a good and faithful servant in the public schools of Kansas City.

June, 1921—"Here":

Every Girl stood alone on Conference Point looking out over the river, red and gold from the reflection of the last flaming sunset she would see from this point. She was an interested listener to absorbing Sophomore discussionals upon "The Girl Reserve and Her Family; Her School; Her Community"; an interesting demonstration of First Aid and Nature Studies. In the Junior Triangle meetings she learned the width of her world through a compelling service program and found them reporting upon their contributions to different charitable organizations and planning special good times. In her own Senior group she joined in the search for deeper things of the spirit—the search for a suitable vocation and for her opportunities as a future citizen. With a deepening sense of the value of the whole four-year program, she returned to the larger triangle meeting to give her support to the social events, the song-fests, the Camp and Conference rallies, the Senior Farewell. Surely, in her school world she had not found it too hard to be a Keeper of the Light.

June, 1922—"Everywhere":

Commencement and Every Girl stood at the cross roads filled with the inspiration of four years of gaining, growing and giving. The real test lay ahead, she knew, in the great "Everywhere" to which she was going. There, most of all, must she be a trusted "Keeper of the Light."

Pep, jollity and geniality, but beneath the surface something deeper. The G. H. S. C. meetings this year have had all this and more. They have had meetings from which each girl might take uplifted and helpful thoughts, meetings full of fun, spirit and inspiration.

We have had a membership of about 300 girls. On the first Monday of each month, the big open club meetings were held; on the second and fourth Mondays the various

Some eight years ago Mr. Robinson, then a Y. M. C. A. worker in Kansas City, saw the need of some Christian organization for boys in the schools. He had a vision of what such an organization would mean to the boys, the school, and the community. 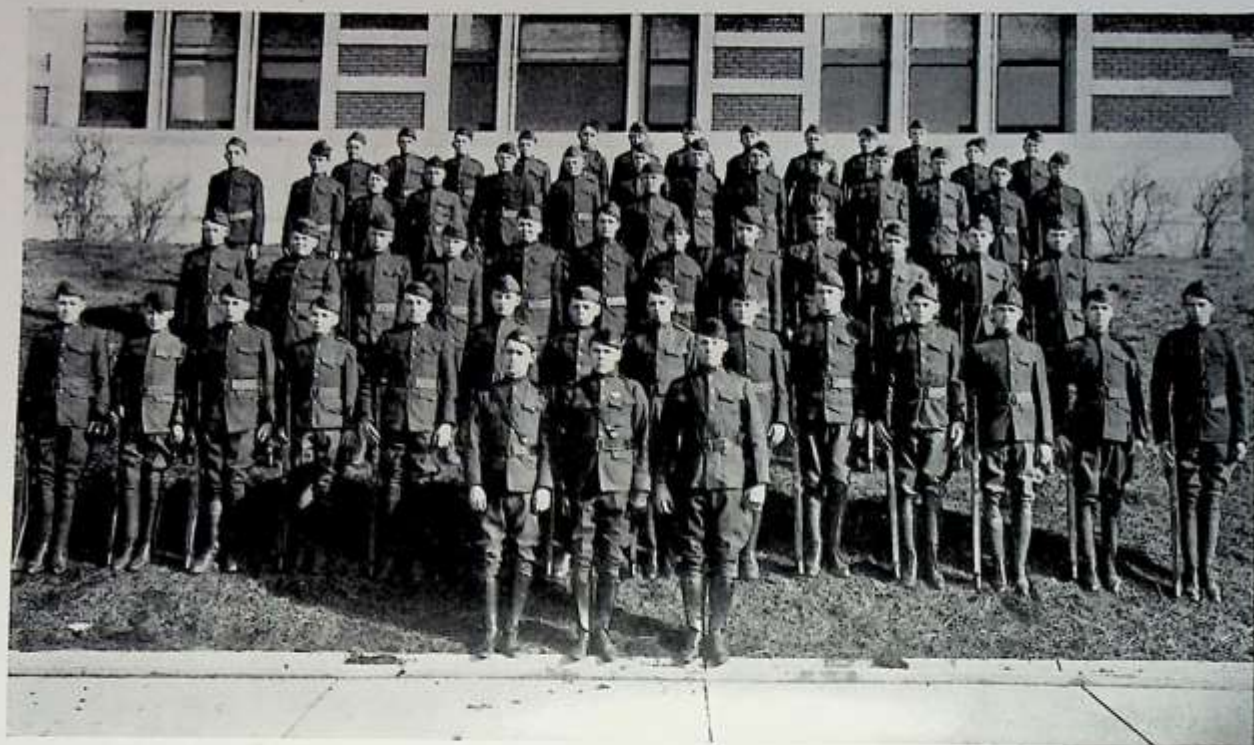

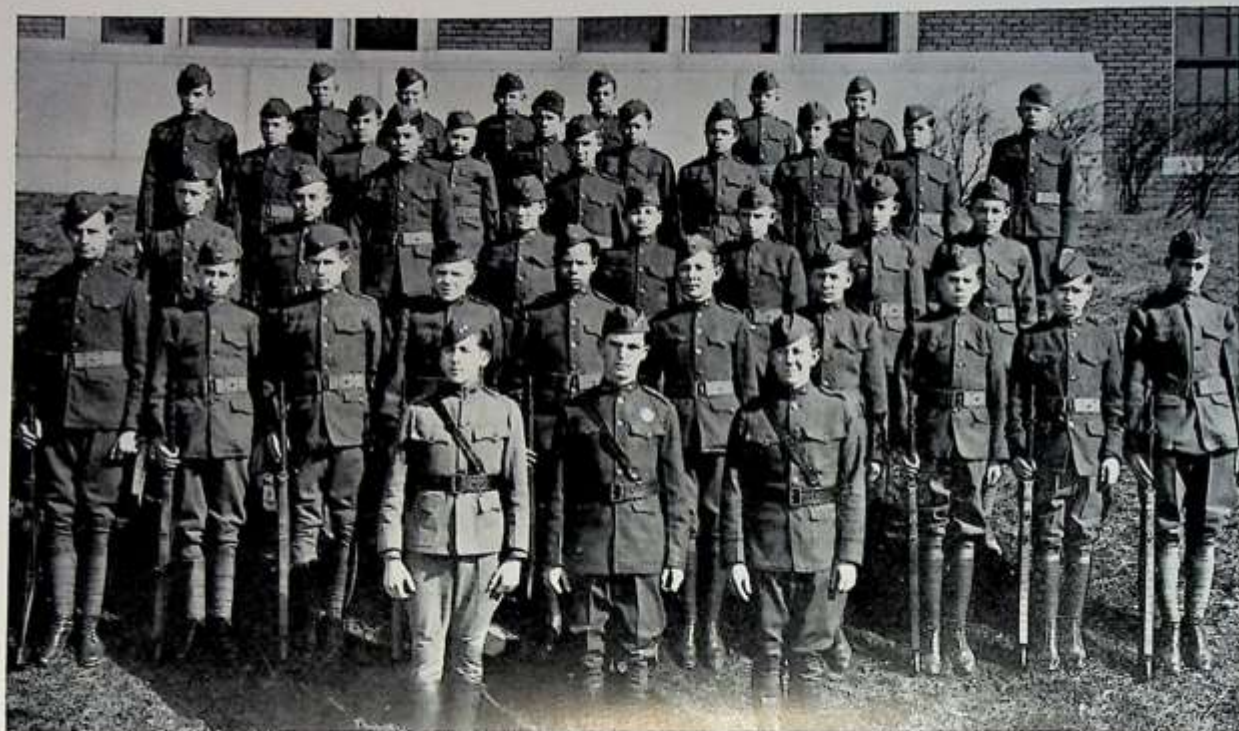

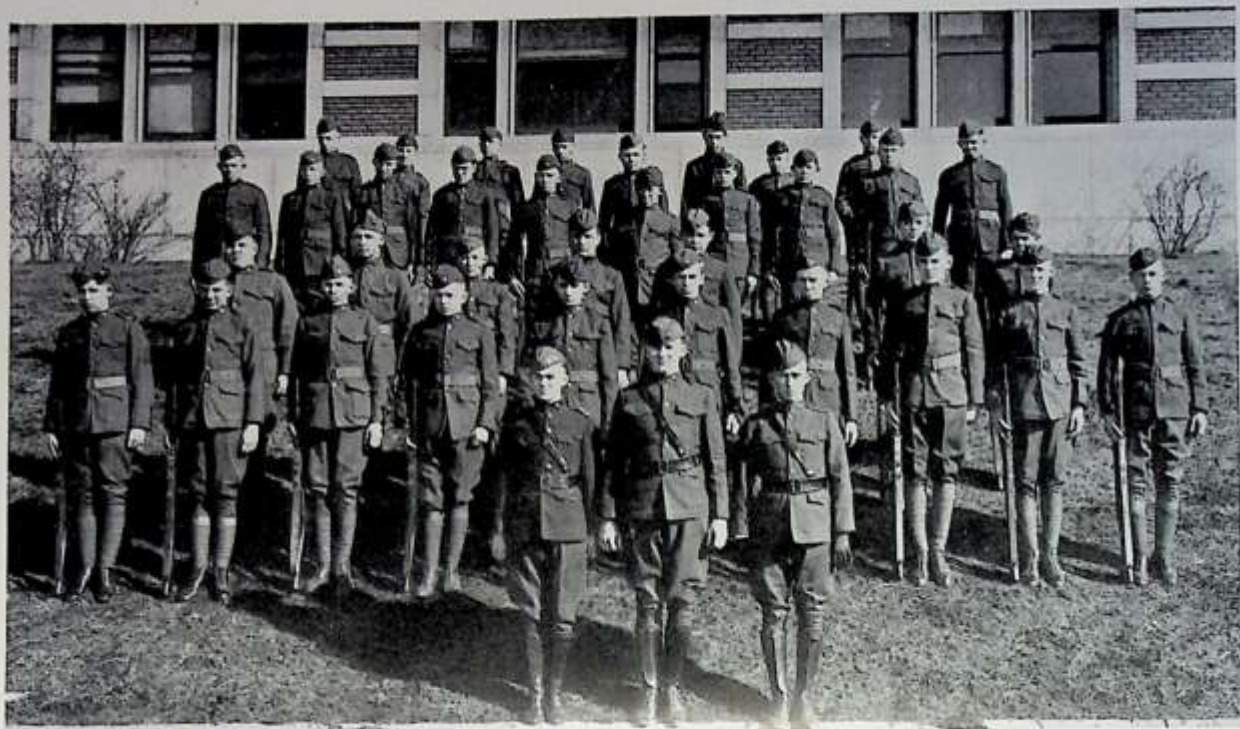

FIRST INTERSCHOLASTIC BASKETBALL GAME

Basketball is more popular in Kansas City than any other city in the United States. A record crowd assembled in Convention Hall, January 14, to witness the opening games.

In the first contest Northeast won from Manual, 25 to 9, while Central beat Westport in the second game, 30 to 25. Northeast, with only one letter man, Captain George Deniston, succeeded in gaining a victory over Manual, who has three veterans, which was not only a surprise to Northeast but to most basketball fans.

Deniston played a fine floor game for the Purple. He and Nick Onofrio were responsible for most of the points. Koonse and Miller hung to their men like leeches. Griggs got the jump on McDonough of Manual most of the time.

In the second game, January 28, Northeast bowed her head in defeat for the first time in two years and the second in three. But it took Central an

extra five minutes to win the victory, for the score stood 23 to 23 at the end of the regular playing period.

Fully ten thousand people witnessed two of the hardest-fought games ever played by high school teams in Convention Hall. In the opener Westport won over Manual, 25 to 20, after which Central beat Northeast by three points, 26 to 23, in a play-off.

In the first game Manual showed a great improvement over their showing in the first round. They had confidence in goal shooting and they had fight and speed, but they did not have the ability to stop Westport. O'Sullivan of Manual was put out of the game for unnecessary roughness, and Brewster of Westport for personal fouls. However, it was a closely-fought game, Westport forging ahead in the last quarter.

The second game, Central and Northeast, was the event of the evening. Northeast, being the undefeated team for the past two years, was not popular. From the start to the finish this contest was so even that neither team at any time held more than a 4-point lead. It was seldom that great. At the end of the first quarter the count was at 8-all; at the half mark it found Northeast holding the upper hand, 13 to 10; at the third quarter Northeast retained its three points, 19 to 16.

The last quarter was a whirlwind for action. The crowd, unable to restrain itself, gathered about the court. The time was drawing to a close when Bacchus of Central made a goal. The score had been: Northeast 23, Central 19. That made Central 21. Again Bacchus made the goal which tied the score and the gun exploded.

The referee called for an after-play. Miller of Northeast was called on a foul and Burton of Central made the free throw. Bacchus made another goal and the time was up, with Central leading by three points.

The third of the series of games was played on the evening of February 3. Every available space in Convention Hall was occupied long before the game opened. The contest was thrilling from start to finish and the victory clean-cut. Manual defeated Central, 24 to 20, and Northeast won from Westport, 31 to 13.

Manual and Central played the first game. Manual, humbled twice by Northeast and Westport, showed such a wonderful burst of speed, such fine aggressiveness, against Central that the ultimate result was shadowed right from the start.

The clever shooting of Deniston, Onofrio and Miller helped to roll up Northeast's score considerably. Koonse, Lapin, Jeffries and McDonald each played well and added to the score for Northeast. Westport used nine men in an effort to find a combination which could cope with Northeast, but without any satisfactory result.

Referee F. C. Allen was aided by "Red" Brown, who was used as an umpire, and as a result considerably more fouls were detected, Manual making 12, Central 19, Westport 16, and Northeast 13 fouls.

The second contest lacked many of the thrills contained in the opener. After starting out by obtaining a 6-point lead Westport collapsed and Northeast soon took the lead and gradually widened it. The Northeast line-up was excellent and the boys played a most enthusiastic and clever game.

Approximately ten thousand people assembled in Convention Hall on the evening of February 18 to witness the fourth game of the series. Central and Northeast had the inside track and the rivalry was intense. The games ended with the scores: Central 24 to Westport 13, and Northeast 22 to Manual 17.

Manual and Northeast battled through a hot session in the second game. This contest was stubbornly waged by both teams. At one time in the third quarter the teams were tied, 10 to 10. Then they moved up to 12-all.

McDonough of Manual gained two additional counters, thus giving Manual a 4-point lead in the last quarter. The excitement was intense. A nice goal by Miller and one by Deniston, and the score was tied. Up and down the court the two fives raced. Then Moulder inserted for Manual. He was penalized for advancing. Lapin posed carefully and his free chance was true. O'Sullivan was called on a personal and Deniston made eighteen. The game was over. Deniston made victory doubly certain with two goals.

On the evening of February 22, the fifth basketball game was played in Convention Hall before a wildly enthusiastic audience. The game brought victory to Central and Westport, defeat to Northeast and Manual. The scores were 23 to 17 and 31 to 29.

It was a battle royal between Central and Northeast, but Central had the edge on the Purple throughout the game.

At the start of the second half Bacchus rung up two goals in succession, giving his team a 6-point lead. From then on, Northeast fought only well enough to stay too far in the rear for hope of victory. Koonse, Jordan and Lapin are to be commended highly for their efficient guarding. Deniston, Onofrio and Miller worked like Trojans, but it simply was not Northeast night.

There was not so much at stake in the second game but that made no difference. Manual and Westport were in there battling and their frenzied efforts brought the crowd to its feet. In the last quarter, when the score surged back and forth and the sphere was carried back and forth down the court, the crowd went wild. With about a minute to go, Westport took the lead and forged to the front down the stretch. Players were throwing themselves into the game with a heartiness which compelled admiration. Westport seemed sure of winning with only a minute to play, but Manual got a free throw and made it, just as the whistle blew. The game was tied.

The floor was then cleared and the play-off started.

For five minutes the teams flew back and forth over the court, first one making a goal and then the other. The excitement was intense when, just before the time was up, Tuttle of Westport, made a goal which gave that school the game.

The last game of the high school basketball season was played March 3, in Convention Hall, before a record audience. Fully ten thousand people proclaimed to the public that the popularity of basketball had not waned during the season. The question as to which school would win the championship was on every tongue.

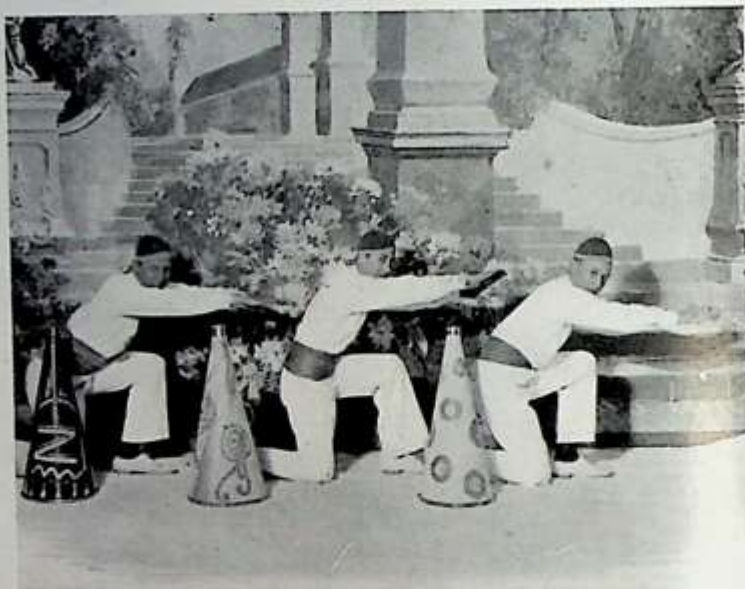
In the first game Northeast played in excellent form to win from Westport, 30 to 23, thereby gaining a tie for first place with Central. Manual defeated Central, 13 to 12, thus making Westport and Manual tie for second place.

The first game found both teams hitting the basket in approved style.

In the third period Northeast forged ahead and finished, 21 to 18, in the lead. From then on the Purple cagers had matters well in hand and finished with points to spare. Every member of the team played well and when Don McDonald was put in to give Deniston a rest, Northeast went wild for he made a goal when it was most needed. Lapin played his best game of the season, guarding well and making two goals and a free throw when the team was just beginning to forge ahead.

The second game between Central and Manual was one of vital interest to Northeast as well as to the contestants. The Central outfit was all primed to defeat Manual to capture the interscholastic championship. But the game ended with the score 13 to 12 in favor of Manual.

WITH THE TEAM AT COLUMBIA

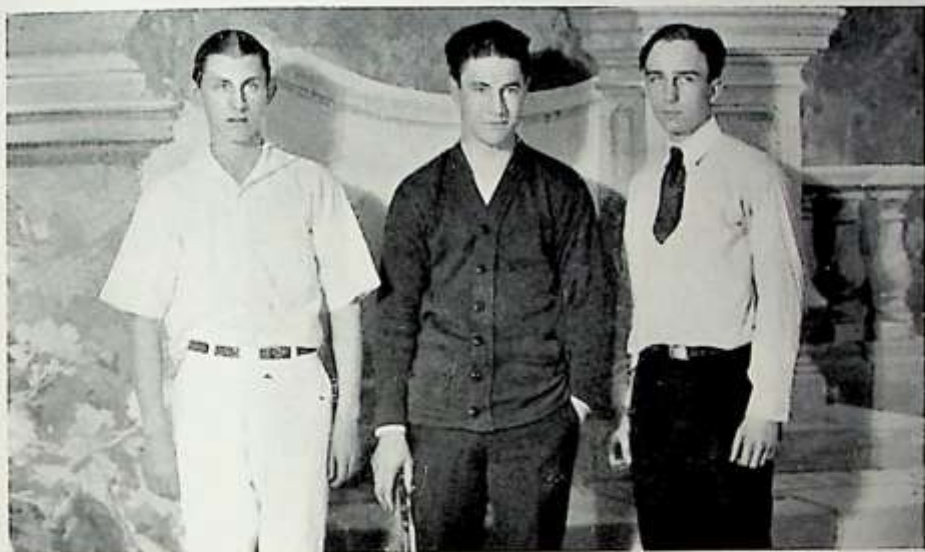

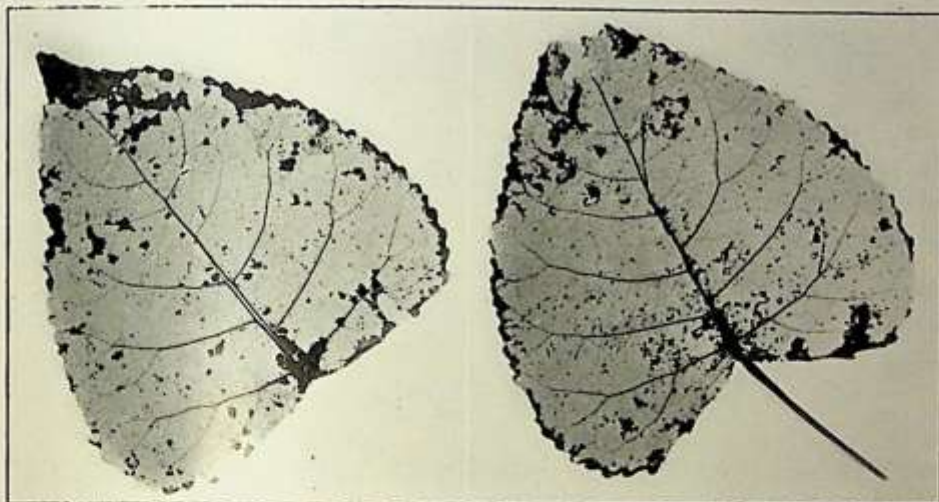

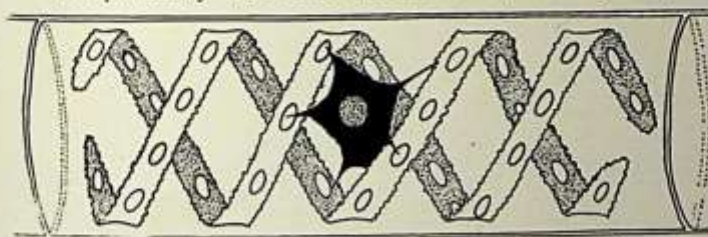
The trees were almost bare last fall when I decided to make an experiment which proved successful. I gathered three green leaves of the cottonwood (*Populus deltoides*), took them home and put them in a pan of water.

After a time the leaves turned black in color, meanwhile adding water enough to keep them covered. When they had been in water for almost a month, I laid them on a smooth piece of porcelain and brushed them very lightly with a soft nail brush. A very little of the epidermis came off. I put them back into the same water and repeated this same brushing process every two weeks.

The last time they were brushed was in the latter part of January. I took them out of the black, slimy water, rinsed them, laid them between heavy blotters and pressed them.

This network of vascular bundles remaining makes up the water-mains of the leaf, as it were, and in return, through parallel tubes, carries the sugar, made in the leaf, back to the stem.

This drawing represents one of the oddest of plants, *Spirogyra*, commonly called pond scum. It is a clear, green, silky thread, which is so fine that with others it seems to form one solid mass. It grows in still water. When the day is sunny it floats on the surface of the water, floated by tiny bubbles of oxygen which it produces in making its food. The chloroplast is the organ that performs this process and is spirally wound inside the cell. This enables the chloroplast to be exposed on all sides to the sun. The nucleus is the center or life of the cell and is supported by threads of cytoplasm which extend to food reservoirs in the chloroplast.
