Although he was told he was going to watch skydiving, Ace secretly believed he might be going to visit his high school.

They arrived at the Lyle Viers Alumni Room and were greeted by Velma Showalter, Carter, and numerous members of both the staff and students (future alumni). We don't know who was more surprised, Ace or the students. Mr. Asty posed for pictures to record his visit while reminiscing about his years at Theta Den.

One of his classes was printing where students prepared publications, including setting type and printing the Courier. The Alumni Room has an extensive collection of these early newspapers and while there, copies from 1931-33 were reviewed by him. He didn't remember any one particular article, however, he does remember that he received an S (Superior) while a pretty girl received an E (Excellent). Mr. Asty protested and got his E after telling the teacher he would quit because he felt he was doing more work than the pretty girl.

He told of a buddy bringing his car to metal shop where it could be worked on by the class. He and his friend would put a few miles on the car after class and then bring it right back in for more work. In those days, classes were offered that taught the students life skills and vocations to prepare them for jobs to support their families.

After graduation, Mr. Asty worked for Battle Manufacturing before joining the military in WWII. He served in the Field Artillery Observation Battalion. He reached the rank of Sgt. Technician. This job placed him near the front lines and his unit was responsible for measuring the distance of shooting, so that our troops knew where the enemies were. Mr. Asty received two Battle Stars for serving in the Rhineland and Central European Theatres. After WWII, he tried several jobs, one of which was at Sheffield Steel. He learned welding in the service and it was helpful to him when he worked at GM where he worked 35 years as a skilled tradesman. Upon retirement, he held a number positions for many years.

Mr. Asty was in the ROTC at Northeast and these are plans to have him tell of his adventures to the current ROTC students and perhaps see the Girl's ROTC Drill Team perform. Mr. and Mrs. Asty attended the annual Dinner Dance and we are hopeful they will be there again this year. If you know Mr. Asty or if you were a classmate of his, we know he would appreciate sharing down memory lane with you. It was certainly our pleasure to meet him and to be able to have him see his school again.

Thanks to Coach Bill Kaus '74, the Northeast Vikings cross country team got a second chance. Both the boy's and girl's teams were eliminated from the 2007-08 school year sports program. Coach Kaus would be starting from scratch for the 2009 season.

What made this comeback even sweeter, was the Boy's team winning the League title for a record 17th time. The Boy's placed six runners on the All-League team led by Mohamed Aways, Alfred Hink, Abdi Dixie, Abdi Ibrahim Farah, Ali Hassan, Cody Lee and Ayuk Nink. Whitney McDowell made the Girl's All-League team. Coach Kaus was awarded Coach of the Year for the Boy's team by the Interscholastic League.

The Boy's team had several strong finishes this year placing 2nd in three meets (Minor Park Invitational, Randolph Invitational and the Sherwood Invitational). Memories Through the Years...

NOT MEMORY LANE BUT MEMORY ALLEY By John C. Dods '51

Alleys are a thing of the past, no longer a part of new neighborhoods in the burgeoning suburbs. But for kids who grew up in the early era when alleys were part of the urban landscape, those backyard homes were special places for play and the sharing of the secrets of childhood.

I well remember the alleys that traversed the Old Northeast neighborhood where I grew up. Even though the streets offered smoother surfaces for roller skating, bicycling and the games of long summer evenings, it was in the alleys that we could create our own world, away from the restraints of grown-up rules. Alleys, in those days, had their purposes. They were the route of the trash haulers, garbage trucks and coal vans that serviced every block.

Many alleys were unpaved, protected only with the ashes and cinders spread from the coal-fired furnaces of every house. Trash was often thrown into discarded barrels along the boundary of the alley. Before the days of the environmental concerns, combustible diamonds were buried in those barrels, fueling the neighborhood with the acid stench of trash fires. Household garbage was put out unbagged to await the infrequent pickup by the garbage man. Alleys, almost by definition, were dirty places, where the debris of life was tossed or stored, away from the public view.

But for kids, alleys were places for salvage of discarded items that could be converted, with imagination, into props for childhood fantasies - old tires to be turned into swings, broken furniture reclaimed to furnish soap lumber and cardboard for a clubhouse base to spring up on some vacant lot.

It was in the alley that we could build a bonfire around which we gathered to tell stories or pretend in our imagination that it was the campfire of a lone patrol of buffalo hunters or a gang of treasure-seeking pirates, all as we polished out cleaned, roasted potatoes - the staple food of hide-bound fires.

Those days are now long gone. There's not an alley within miles of my suburban home where neighborhood custom decrees the backyard be as groomed as the front. Neither bonfire smoke nor trash fire soot drifts across my patio. Yet somehow, I miss the brown cinders and untidy remains of that old neighborhood, where childhood imagination and ingenuity were all a kid needed to make life an adventure and even an alley a special place.

We want to thank Ron Roberts '66 for submitting this article to us by John C. Dods who passed away this past year. John practiced law with the Shock, Hardy & Bacon Law firm for 50 years. He also served as a Chouteau Municipal Court Judge and an Assistant Clay County Prosecutor. He was President of the University of Missouri-Kansas City Law Foundation and President of the Kansas City Metropolitan Bar Association.

John had communicated with Ron, complimenting Ron on a story that he had written previously and how he had enjoyed Ron's piece, "Sandwiches" about "sandwiches." In the letter to Ron, John told him he had a real hank for story telling and he enclosed the alley story which we have printed.

AS TIME GOES BY...

Neighborhood icons such as Sears Roebuck and the Montgomery Ward stores have been replaced with strip malls and large anchor stores in huge malls, but we can all remember shopping at these great stores or maybe even being employed by one of them. Along with remembering the big stores, how about the corner drug stores such as Alvested's at St. John and Bellair or Sander's at St. John and White or Malcain's on St. John and Ellsworth to name just a few that come to mind. But these wonderful, friendly, family owned drugstores have been replaced by the Walgreen types in America.

At these old drugstores, you could buy anything from a vanilla phosphate to toothache medicine and some of them smelled of medicine. No one cared because even though it was probably flavored up, you could hang out with your friends for hours after school. That smell didn't stop you from ordering a malt (not a shake) and either sitting in a booth or at a small table to wait for a friend or two to show up.

As time goes by, new history and memories are being made for those of different generations, but some of us will always remember the good times at our corner drugstores.

Northeast News Looks to 77th Year

For over 77 years, The Northeast News has continued to serve as the independent voice of the Historic Northeast Community. Throughout the years, the Northeast News team has been devoted to bringing the stories that impact Historic Northeast directly to our readers doorsteps. We plan to continue our tradition of advocating for our community. Publisher Michael Bushnell said, "We are full of excitement moving into 2009."

The newspaper's history dates back to its founding in 1932. Not much is known of these years as most of the paper's archives were lost during the 1970's or 80's. News of WWII was featured in the paper's early years. Tom Patten and Mr. Hill produced the paper in the 1950's, 60's and early 70's. Then in 1976, Terry and Mary Brock purchased the Northeast News and relocated it from the 3600 block of St. John Avenue to 6513 Independence Avenue, next to the old Shell Funeral Home. Later it would move back to the 4620 block of St. John Avenue. Under the Brock's, the business expanded adding typesetting services and partnering with a local print shop to provide printing services.

In the 80's and 90's, the paper's direction turned toward being a local shopper circular without much community news included. In 1996, Michael Bushnell and wife, Chris Adams, purchased the paper with the goal of steering it back to the quality news source it had once been. They then relocated to the old Miller Real Estate building at 5715 St. John in 2001. Ironically, that's where Bushnell closed on his first house in Northeast in 1996!

Today, the award-winning publication is printed weekly, delivered to Nor'easter's doorsteps every Wednesday, full of meaningful news, features and advertisements.

The Northeast News has been the recipient of numerous awards from the Missouri Press Association for excellence in journalism including first place awards in business and government coverage. Additionally, the paper was recently recognized by Crime Stoppers International for being an excellent media partner in fighting crime in the community, edging out over 1,800 publications around the world for the award.

Along with staff and ownership changes over its' 77 years, the newspaper has seen technological shifts with the times. In 2005, the newspaper launched its web edition of the paper at www.northeastnews.net. Two years later, the Northeast buzz blog was launched at www.nobuzz.blogspot.com bringing Bonny's buzz of Northeast to readers in real time.

We continue to upgrade, said Publisher, Michael Bushnell. In both our print product and our web site, we're adding exclusive new features designed specifically for our Historic Northeast community.

The Northeast News staff thanks the community for embracing the independent publication for 77 years and looks forward to many more.
