Charles (Mike) Self

A Northeast Great from the Greatest Generation

Charles Walter (Mike) Self, graduated from Northeast High School in 1936. Following graduation the family moved to Sugar Creek, Mo., and his father left home leaving Mike as the sole support of his mother and five sisters. Mike took a job with Standard Oil, though it was in the midst of the Depression, he always managed Christmas gifts for everyone in the family by working three jobs. After war broke out in 1941, Mike was inducted into the Army Air Corp and trained as a Gunner on a B-24 as well as being a firearms instructor. He was sent to the 376 Bomber Group of the 15th Air Force and was stationed at Bari. Italy. Mike's crew flew 21 missions without any fighter escort where he lost many friends, and the group lost a lot of B-24's. Mike made raids to Regensburg and Winnerneustadt, and well as two raids to Ploesti, Romania the source of much of the German oil supply. Mike was a tail gunner and a waist gunner on these missions.

On 23 April 1944, his 27th mission to a German aircraft factory on the outskirts of Vienna, Austria, flak hit the right side of the aircraft. With two engines out and another on fire the decision was made to parachute from the aircraft. This was 600 miles deep in enemy territory and near the Austrian border with Yugoslavia. While coming down in the parachute he remembered that the fields and trees reminded him of the Ozarks. On landing he broke his ankle, and he lay unconscious for a time. Mike tried to get up and did the best to bury his parachute when he observed a man standing a short distance away from him smoking a pipe. The man smoking the pipe was soon joined by six other men who were armed and after interrogating Mike at gunpoint determined that he was an American. The crew had been found by Tito's partisans. Eight of the crew were smuggled to Greece and then across the Adriatic Sea back to Bari, Italy. Mike and the aircraft navigator could not walk and were taken to the mountains where they were constantly moved to stay one step ahead of the Germans. They were moved farther into the mountains living in caves and sleeping on hillsides. On one occasion they were caught out in open by German aircraft and strafed. Once while hiding in a cave they could hear German soldiers who were cutting wood nearby talking. This took place over a period of four to five months.

The partisans were able to contact American intelligence, and Mike and the navigator were taken to open countryside with a field suitable to land an airplane. The local men cut brush and piled it into a straight line to mark a landing field. They were also met by a half dozen other airman who had been rescued by the partisans. The weather was dark and gloomy, and the local men were anable to light the damp brush when they heard the C-47 approach. The plane did not land which was a great disappointment for those waiting on the ground. The next night the C-47 returned and the brush was lit. The plane circled, landed and taxied to where the men were standing on the field. The men were packed into the plane including some of the partisans who were apparently working for the underground. Mike worried that the plane was too heavily loaded. but the pilot took it to the end of the strip before yanking the wheels up. The aircraft skimmed the trees to avoid enemy radar. They were taken to Bari and then to Naples where they were returned to America by ship. On return to the U.S. Mike was sent to O'Reilly General Hospital in Springfield, Missouri where he had surgery for his ankle. He was given a medical discharge on 26 June 1945.

Following his return to the U.S. Staff Sergeant Charles Walter (Mike) Self was awarded The Distinguished Flying Cross, The Silver Star, Five Air Medals and a Purple Heart. He returned to his job at Standard Oil and married Derothy Hawkins who had lived next door to a friend of his. Dorothy had corresponded with him while he was in Europe. Mike and Dorothy had one daughter Linda Lloyd who currently teaches school in Blue Springs, Mo. and a son-in-law Frank Lloyd. Mike and Dorothy had four grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Mike was also a deacon and an elder in the RLDS church.

Sadly, Mike passed away on the 30th of December 2010. A narrative of his story in completion will be available at the dinner dance, June 17th for those who would like to read more about Mike. It will be kept permanently for display by the Alumni Association.

A TRIBUTE ...

This year the dinner dance, golf tournament and some parts of this issue are dedicated to our Alumni who have served or who are serving in the military. We are forever in their debt and wish this to be a tribute to them and to their families. Most of us have no idea what life was like when World War II took place or when our generation had Vietnam to learn from, but those who served, remember it like it was yesterday. Young men and women today are in foreign countries protecting the freedom of others and making sure that war does not come to our door. These are special Alumni with some having paid the ultimate price...

World War II is currently being featured on a wall in our Lyal Viers Alumni room. I recommend that you see it. Many Alumni have sent and are sending pictures and memorabilia to be on display for the summer. The items will then be kept in a Memory book. To think that we are able to capture even a small portion of what it was like through these pictures is amazing to me. As part of this tribute to our service men and women, you should also see the World War II Memorial and spend some time looking at the wonderful documentation of this difficult time in everyone's lives. It is very humbling to see it.

We have the honor of having Charles R. Long as an alumnus who received the Medal of Honor for bravery and who is now honored in the newly completed Veteran's Hall in Independence, MO. General Maxwell Taylor was a soldier with many awards and accolades and another Northeast Notable. These soldiers are true heroes who served their country well.

I recently read that while service men and women are fighting a war, all service men and women wear their fatigues as a silent pledge to the ones fighting the war. If that is true, I think it is a great thing to do. You may not support a war, but you should always support our troops. Let this issue serve as a small token of our appreciation and as a tribute to our Alumni who have, and who are, serving to protect us and keep us safe!

Gladstone Theater Memories By Joe Davis

When we were kids, there was a man frequently standing on the corner of Lawn and Sunrise Dr., by Gladstone School. One afternoon in the early fall, he was passing out fliers to the kids leaving school regarding the 5 cent "Brer Fox" Saturday matinee at the Gladstone (also called the "Jolly Rock") Theater. My brother Bob and I spent many Saturday afternoons there watching the Movietone News, cartoons, short subjects and a serial where the heroine gets into some kind of trouble right at the end so that you have to go back the following Saturday to see how the hero rescues her. Then there was the feature....often a Western of some ilk. Mom would give us 15 cents, which would cover admittance for Bob and me and candy or popcorn to share. Before the movie started, there was always a program of some sort. Sometimes it was the dance studio putting on a dance recital. Always we had to sing the Br'er Fox song and if we didn't sing it loud enough, the manager would have us keep singing until it was to his satisfaction!

When I was a sophomore at Northeast, I dated a girl who lived in the area. I took her to the Gladstone a couple of times on walking dates, since I was too young to drive. Eventually she dumped me for a junior who had a car.

Just east of the theater, there was a hamburger joint named the "Log Cabin Inn." We couldn't go in because "Mom" served beer inside. "Mom" lived close by and she ran back and forth from the Inn to her house to replenish food items that she ran out of. After graduation from Northeast, I would often go there for a 5 cent 'burger after a movie:..one of the best 'burgers I've had!

Dad was not much for going to movies, unless it was a Charlie Chan movie. One Saturday around 1932, he spent all day waxing his '31 Chevy and at dinner announced that he was taking the family to the Gladstone Theater that night. We lived within blocks of the theatre, but Dad announced that we would drive. He parked his car right under a street light on St John, half a block away from the theater.

When we came out of the theatre, the car was gone and Dad called the police and reported it stolen.

About the middle of the next week, Dad got a call from the police telling him that his stripped car had been found across the river in North Kansas City sitting on a mud road. The headlights, taillights, license plates, bumpers and wheels were all gone and the car was sitting on the body down in the mud. The thieves had started to shave the city license off the windshield, but apparently got frightened away after they had made only one cut through it. That is how they identified the car as ours. The Platte County Sheriff called Kansas City and gave them the city license number and they traced that number to Dad. Dad got his car back, and the insurance company rebuilt it for him. Mom and Dad were happy, but we never drove his car to the Gladstone movie again. Come to think about it, as far as I can recall, Dad never went to the Gladstone Theater again....ever.

Yes, I have some great memories of the Gladstone, "Jolly Rock" theatre!

The theatre has since burned down due to an electrical fire.

MEMORIES THROUGH THE YEARS AND NORTHEAST FACTS

NEW PLAN III CLASS

Taken from 1935 Yearbook

The New Plan is a 3 year course beginning in the junior year of high school. The plan has three divisions: the Engineering, the Liberal Arts, and the Secretarial. A fourth division, as yet not wholly separated from the Liberal Arts, is the Pre-Medics Course.

As the entire New Plan has developed, each division has become more efficient and educational. The growth of better facilities has been rapid. The handicaps that accompany each new experiment and beneficial progress are slowly disappearing and the course is assuming a more finished aspect.

Graduation under the New Plan requires the satisfactory completion of the first 2 years of college. Upon completion of this plan, the Engineering students and Liberal Arts students may enter as juniors in any College of Arts and Sciences or School of Engineering, and the graduates of the Secretarial course are competent to begin work with a foundation of high school training and 2 years of business education.

A new experiment, the publication of the "College World," originated this year. Several editions of the paper were printed and enthusiastically received. The staff of the paper served a semester each and were selected by the Editorial board which was elected by the Class.

Two dances were sponsored by the Class this year and gay times were had. The first dance served as a Home Coming celebration for former New Plan graduates and was held December 20, 1934. The second occurred March 29, 1935, and it too was favorably attended.

A fine fellowship existed and was further promoted by the joint pot luck suppers of the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A. clubs. These evenings of gaiety and seriousness developed bonds of friendship that everyone will cherish a long time.

Our scholastic and social life this year has been pleasant—forming warm memories for future years.

FACTS ABOUT NORTHEAST-1914

- The whole building may be heated in 20 minutes.
- The air throughout the whole building may be changed in 8 minutes.
- All water for drinking, bathing and swimming pool is filtered.
- Has a complete telephone system with 61 telephones.

FACTS ABOUT NORTHEAST -1914 continued

- A show day was held to let the public see the facility top to bottom. (Over 14,000 attended the open house and dedication)
- It is the most modern high school building in the West.
- The largest high school building in Kansas City being 27 per cent larger than Westport high School and 8 percent larger the Southeast High School.
- The building is 300x196 feet and four stories high.
- The building is of solid concrete with brick facades.
- The roof is of solid concrete slabs and is fireproof.
- It cost \$625,000.
- Has an auditorium seating 1500 persons, the Shubert Theater seats only 200 more.
- Has a room for community gatherings seating 250 persons
- Has a branch of the Public Library containing many thousands of volumes for convenience of the people of the northeast, a reading room and another reference library for pupils only.
- The school will accommodate 1600 pupils.
- Contains a gymnasium 100x60 feet, large enough for 4 basketball teams to practice at once, and a track 21 laps to the mile.
- An auxiliary gymnasium with all sorts of apparatus for corrective exercises.
- A playground large enough for 8 games of basketball to be played at once.
- A swimming pool lined with white enamel 6 1/2 feet deep.
- A complete laundry, where all towels, napkins and bathing suits will be washed and sterilized.
- Its own soap plant wherein all soap used in the school will be made.
- A hot air apparatus where 6 girls may dry their hair at once.
- Makes its own electric light.
- Has a dining room seating 750 persons at once.
- All rooms and hallways have 14 foot ceilings.
- Has a complete business college, wherein a full business course from stenography to banking is taught.
- Has facilities for full courses in vocational training from joinery to shop work.
- Has equipment for full courses in cooking, dress making and millinery work.
- Has a master clock which by compressed air sent through tubes operates 27 other clocks and rings program bells in classrooms.
- All air in building is pumped thru a sheet of falling water, cleansing it before forced into classrooms maintained at 70.

Alumni Room Treasures By Roberta Holt Kipper

Since I started to work weekly in the Alumni Room a few years ago, I have come to love and appreciate the many treasures that have been collected. One treasure in particular, I find myself drawn to over and over. It is a 1940's photo taken of an upholstery shop with the phone number CH-4134 in lights prominently displayed in its window. Many a student, teacher and alumni have caught me sitting on the floor scanning this picture which is at least 20 x 24. This window, I now know, was located at St. John and Lawndale and has long had its windows bricked in.

The window is covered in framed and unframed photos of NE neighborhood residents who were off to war in service to "we the people" during WW II. There must be 100's of photos from all branches, some formal, some with families, but most, if not all, men and women in uniform. There is a small American flag prominently displayed in the center of the photo.

I scan this picture looking for my dad and his two brothers who, although NEHS students, left their education to answer the call to serve our nation during the call to war. This picture has led many of us to discuss with students currently in high school, the rights and privileges of citizenship and, alas, the cost of it in war times. It's led to discussions on selective service and the uncertainty of it, with a generation who have never known it. Northeast is still a school where the military service is chosen by many, including one at West Point, one of this nation's great military academies,

Recently, while working on a pictorial display for the South wall in the Alumni Room on WW II, we came across an undated yellowed newspaper article from the KC Star on this window. The article says that there were over 300 pictures of servicemen and women in the window. Many of the women were WAC's and Army Nurses. We don't have their stories; we just know that they were NE residents, some who had known each other from childhood. All of them had a proud family who probably passed this window every day on purpose. The article states that the window display was only up from July 1"-July 10th. The year is not listed in the article, but we know it was somewhere between Pearl Harbor and D-Day. The article also states that many of the soldiers in the picture had received the Purple Heart or other citations for heroism. Two had died, one stateside and one on duty in North Africa. As I read through the list of names, I recognize many from the Alumni Association, but alas, I didn't find the names of my dad and his brothers. Even knowing they're not in the picture, I'll bet that someone will find me on the floor still scanning the faces in the window.

It's my hope that you will visit us in the Alumni Room and to see the picture and article as well as other WW II memorabilia which will be on display through Veteran's Day 2011. Look for me - you know now where I'll be.

CALLING ALL VIKINGS

The Alumni Room is doing a pictorial presentation on Viking Heroes of WWII. We are requesting small snapshots of you or any Viking who went to NE during the war years. We are looking for small pictures of you or your Viking loved one in uniform or at play. We are looking for homeland pictures, pictures of victory gardens or of you at work in one of the many defense plants, some right here in KC. For those in the military, please include their rank, branch of service, location of service and their years at NE, if known. For homeland pictures, where and of what was it taken. Some pictures and memorabilia are starting to come in.

Currently, we have run across a small treasure of WWII memorabilia. A photograph of a landing craft, nicknamed the "Viking" was paid for by the students and staff at NE, through war stamps, bonds, scrap and oil drives. We've also come across a wonderful pictures of the student body forming a "V" for Victory on the parade ground. Sadly, a very special treasure is a list of our boys lost during WWII.

We would like to continue the display into the fall by honoring ALL of our military warriors from 1914 to our current generation. Our display will morph each month until Veterans Day, November 8th, where we will have collected Viking service personnel past and present where they will be honored. After that date, we would like to put these items into a scrapbook for future generations of Viking's to honor.

Charles Richard Long (December 10, 1923 February 12, 1951) was a United States Army soldier who received the United States military's highest decoration, the Medal of Honor, for his actions in the Korean War. A native of Independence, Missouri, and a graduate of Northeast High School, Long joined the Army after high school and served in Europe during World War II. Recalled to active duty for the Korean War, he served as a sergeant and forward observer for a mortar platoon. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his conduct during an assault by a numerically superior force on February 12, 1951, when he voluntarily remained at his forward post and continued to direct mortar fire until being overrun and killed. He was 28 years old when he was killed in action. The newly completed Veteran's Hall at the Truman Memorial Bldg, in Independence, Missouri features the Charles R Long Memorial, including memorabilia and a video. By Connie Evoritt Edwards '63'



ANNOUNCING TWO NEW NOTABLES

Dr. William O. Stevens '44

Bill Stevens was born April 29, 1926 in Absaraka, ND. He graduated from Northeast High School June 9, 1944, where he played football. He married Billy Jean Halley on August 3, 1951 and they had three children and two grandchildren.

While at Central Missouri State University in Warrensburg, MO, he earned a BS in history and economics graduating in 1952. He went on to earn a Master of Science degree in secondary school administration in 1954, a Master of Arts degree in history in 1967 at the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and continued to earn a Doctor of Philosophy degree in history, economics, psychology and sociology in 1970.

Bill served in various public school positions from 1949-1988, during which time he oversaw the integration of Butler High School in 1954 as its principal. He attained considerable distinction as an educator who was appointed History Coordinator for the High School/College Program, College of Arts and Sciences, University of Missouri-Kansas City on September 1, 1988 and brought his illustrious tenure to a close on July 31, 2004, in a well deserved retirement.

Bill deserves mention of his participation in the Jackson County Historical Society, Missouri Council for the Social Studies, Missouri State Historical Society, National Council for History Education, Organization of American Historians, Harry S. Truman Library Institute and Northeast Alumni Association Historian.

The Members of the Missouri Senate, ninety-third General Assembly joined unanimously to applaud the long, productive educational career of Dr. Bill Stevens and to convey to him their heartfelt wishes for a golden retirement, and he was given a special resolution #161 signed by Senator Charles Wheeler.

In high school, Bill graduated with honors, was a member of the National Honor Society, All-City Student Council President, Secretary of the N Club, member of the undefeated football team, and sports editor for the Courier newspaper.

In addition to the college linkage with Northeast High School, Bill, as a Northeast Alumni Association leader and officer, led the effort to set up the annual scholarship program awarded each spring to the qualifying and deserving Northeast graduates. In the spring of 1990, the first newly established Markey-Peters UMKC Scholarship was awarded to a deserving NE graduate, Rachael Quintero. Bill continued volunteering as a major contributor of knowledge and leadership as the Northeast High School Alumni Association grew and developed the funding of scholarships. Bill willingly shared his expertise as the by-laws were developed, insuring a framework and structure for future endeavors.

Bill has always been a hard-working Viking alumnus, as a friend and mentor to all Viking students. He now resides in Centerview, MO., near Warrensburg. He continues to be active in the revised and revitalized N-Club of today and still serves as Historian for the NE Alumni Association.

ARTHUR WILLIAM GEBAUR. JR. '36

Born February 22, 1919 and died August 29, 1952. Missing in Action and Presumed Dead in the Korean War. The Air Force named the Grandview Air Force Base, the Richards-Gebaur in his honor. We have strong evidence to support this alumnus of Northeast is one and the same and, as such, deserves to be a Northeast Notable.

The President of the United States of America, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved July 9, 1918, took pride in presenting the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumously) to Lieutenant Colonel Arthur William Gebaur, Jr. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for Action in the War for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy of the United Nations while serving as a Pilot with the 7th Fighter-Bomber Squadron, 49th Fighter-Bomber Wing, FIFTH Air Force, in action against enemy forces in the Republic of Korea on 29 August 1952.

The successful accomplishment of three quick turn-around missions required the utmost careful planning and execution. Colonel Gebaur determined it was his duty to lead his squadron in all three attacks. Immediately after returning from the first mission, he briefed the Group on flak positions and evasive tactics and then led the Group back to the target. He received a damaging, glancing hit from an 85 millimeter explosive shell, but continued his attack, accurately scoring hits. Coming off his bomb run, Colonel Gebaur spotted eight quadruple .50 caliber gun positions firing at the Group. Completely disregarding the damage to his aircraft and with concern only for the safety of those he led, he attacked the blazing gun positions through intense smoke. Through his superior airmanship, and high personal courage, the gun positions were silenced and the remainder of the Group successfully completed their mission.

Martha Lee Cain Tranby, a 1941 graduate of Northeast High School, was a lifetime resident of Northeast Kansas City. She was a teacher of piano and voice at Northeast High School, and many of us had her as our music teacher! During her lifetime, she also served as church organist at various area churches as well as serving as officers in the Kansas City Chapter of American Guild of Organists. Martha served 30 years as a Province officer of Sigma Alpha lota, was a life member of Pi Lambda Theta, VFW and the Alumni Association of UMKC and KU. Although Martha was a person of modest means, careful planning allowed her to establish the Martha Lee Cain Tranby Music Enrichment Fund in 1991. The purpose of the fund, which is managed by the Greater Kansas City Community Foundation, is to "promote, inspire, foster, encourage, assist with and engage in, either alone or with others. the promotion of music education, composition, performance or any other music endeavor by individuals, groups or institutions". her tolesighted estate planning and insurance meant that, after her death in October 2004, her Fund grew to more than \$1 million. Beneficiaries of the fund have included the KC Chamber Orchestra, the Youth Symphony, the Kansas City Chorale, Music/Arts Institute scholarship students, the Kansas City String Quartet Program, Summerfest and many others. These groups and others have been enriched by her leadership and support. Martha Lee Cain Tranby died at the age of 81 in 2004.
