Address to the JROTC Cadets

Battalion Commander - Larry Cooper

I'd like to thank you all for your hard work, for studying your questions, practicing your drill movements, staying up late to make sure everything is squared away on your uniform. Thank you to every single cadet from the top to the bottom of the chain of command.

It has been an honor to serve as your battalion commander. I am pleased to announce that this year under my command and with the help of my staff and company commanders; we have made history, broken records, and most of all changed lives. We have made our school name synonymous with excellence. By reaching out and working with schools such as Gladstone, James, Northeast Middle, for the first time in the history of the Viking battalion I've ensured that our battalion is committed to help mentor and grow other battalions in the city. In partnership with East High School's Bear battalion, I have established relationships which will carry forward for years to come, where our school is committed to being mentors to other programs in the city.

By producing the "Company Inspection Improvement Chart" we can now literally see our progress as a battalion. I'm leaving this for those leaders next year to use. Myself and my staff set a battalion goal to have the battalion average to a 2.5 or above on a 3 point scale. I'm pleased to announce that our battalion average currently is: 2.45

We've accomplished so much this year, but we shouldn't stop here. I strongly encourage those who replace me next year, to do even better than I did - that's what this whole speech is about. Always strive for excellence and always look in the mirror and see where you can do better, because there is always room for improvement. For example, when I became the Commander, my first order of business was to speak with all of the cadets by visiting all six companies. I also wanted to hear from you, you told me what you would like to be changed; I listened to you and made those changes where I could. And that's what the next commanders should be doing. Please use what I've done as an inspiration to develop yourself and be better than I was. My heart will always be with this battalion, and to those in charge next year I wish you luck.

All and all it was a great year. I am proud of each and every one standing here today; you have all contributed to another memorable year. You all know my story now, I come from the same place you do; you all know what my obstacles were; I made it to where I'm at now and so can you.

Face Your Fears and the Dreams Come True

I transferred to Northeast High School my junior year. My Spanish teacher, Mrs. Knight was concerned about the night job I had a factory. She feared I would be seduced by the money and give up on my future. Even though I was an average student, she saw something in me and I will always remember that she believed in me at a time when I sometimes doubted myself.

Working at that factory helped to pay for college and in 1984 I headed off to the University of Central Missouri State. Summers at home, I waited tables and did two internships at the local TV stations. After graduation I worked for the Kansas City Star Newspaper until I got a call from WCBS Radio in New York. My resume was selected out of hundreds for an interview for a desk assistant position. I moved to New York City six weeks later. Three months after that, I was promoted to their News Operations Coordinator.


From WCBS I took a paid intern position at Post Newsweek TV Stations on Capital Hill, interviewing members of Congress. The position was difficult and so was my boss. But after a couple of missteps, I obtained a few hard to get exclusive interviews and proved myself – both to my boss and more importantly - to myself.

I moved back to New York City a year and a half later to begin work at CBS. I worked on various news shows throughout my tenure but one of my favorite memories was working for "Sunday Morning with Charles Kuralt". The head writer gave an assignment to a group of us that he knew might be impossible to complete. He needed a Purple Heart medal and needed it immediately. Because it was a "impossible" task, those given the assignment knew that if there was a winner, they would probably be promoted to Associate Producer for the annual end of the year Obit segment. Thinking outside the box - I tried an army surplus store. It was and still is an unfortunate fact that many veterans fall through the cracks and I figured that if one of those hero's was in that boat, they might be forced to sell their medal. My hunch paid off and I was proud to win the challenge. And as hoped for, I was awarded with the Associate Producer's position.

In 1996 I helped launch the cable network — "MSNBC" and became a producer on it. Two years after that I headed back to CBS where I took an Associated Producer position with the "Evening News Weekend" and worked on the "60 Minutes Anniversary Special".

I left CBS but not before I met my husband, who works for the "NFL Today" show. We have two great kids and I am now pursuing a career in real estate.

I tell this story because it's important to know that sometimes you have to stop fearing the unknown, take a deep breath and just do it. That was one of the lessons I learned growing up in Northeast and it helped me to get me where I am today. I don't get back to the old neighborhood as often as I'd like, but I miss it and have fond memories of the school, my teachers and the places that made it a great place to grow up.



NORTHEAST HIGH SCHOOL NOTABLE CRITERIA

Definitions to keep in mind while selecting NEHS Notables:

- Worthy of Note: Remarkable, Distinguished and Prominent
- Remarkable: Worthy of being or likely to be noticed, Uncommon, Extraordinary
- Distinguished: Marked by Eminence, Distinction or Excellence
 - The person has received a well-known and significant award or honor, or has been nominated for one several times.
 - The person has made a widely recognized contribution that is part of the enduring historical record in his or her specific field.
 - The person is regarded as an important figure or is widely cited by peers or successors.
 - The person is known for originating a significant new concept, theory or technique.
 - The person has created or played a major co-creating role; of a significant or well-known work or collective body of work that has been the subject of an independent book, feature-length film, or of multiple independent periodical articles or reviews.
 - The person's work either; (a) has become a signification monument (b) have been a substantial part of a significant exhibition, (c) has won significant critical attention, or (d) is represented within the permanent collections of several notable galleries or museums.
 - The person has received a highly prestigious academic awarded or honor at a national or international level.
 - The person is in a field of literature of the fine arts and meets the standards of notability in that
 art.
 - The person who by volunteering his time and efforts to the Northeast community and has enriched the lives of the individuals within the community and contributed to the betterment of society because of his actions.
 - 10. The person who has dedicated a major portion of their life to the distinguished service of the United States either locally, nationally or internationally as in but not limited to - servicemen and women, medical personnel, first responders, religious leaders, secret service, diplomats and ambassadors. Persons who have died or been seriously wounded in service to our neighborhood or country are automatically awarded notable status.

People are likely to be notable if they meet any of the above standards. Failure to meeting these criteria is not conclusive proof that a subject should not be included, conversely, with the exception of the last part of item 10, meeting one or more of these criteria will not guarantee that a subject should be included. A person who fails to meet these criteria may still be notable. Common sense and occasional exceptions many apply.

NOTE: Individuals must have attended Northeast High School but they do not have to have graduated from Northeast to be considered for Notable status.

NOTE: Nominations for Notables may be made by any Northeast Alumni and by following the guidelines as outlined in the "Northeast High School Notable Criteria" document referenced above. A bio should be provided in a one page document outlining their contributions. Supporting documentation should be provided if possible.

At the October 2016 Board Meeting — Two Northeast Alumni were presented and approved as Notables. Their biographies follow on the next two pages.

EDDIE OYER - A Northeast Institution

Eddie grew up in Northeast and has lived here all of his life. He started playing the piano at age 3 and by the time he was 12, he had his union card. He was so talented that at 15 years old, he was playing evenings at many of the downtown hotels, among them, the Continental, the President and the Bellivere. But that was at night. In the day, he worked at his sister's dance studio, playing piano for the dance classes. And it was at that studio that the institution of Eddie Oyer began.

Usually an institution is made of brick and stone, such as Northeast High School but on rare occasions they can be made of skin and bone, and such is the case with Eddie Oyer.

When Eddie's sister decided to leave the studio in 1954 to raise her family, Eddie took it over. So if you grew up in Northeast anytime from 1954 on, and you wanted to learn music or how to dance, chances are, you would have been taught by Eddie Oyer. Over the years he has taught both music and dance to 1,000's of hopeful musician's and dancers. Some of his musical students went on to music careers – including playing with Lawrence Welk's orchestra. While Eddie started his musical career at the tender age of 3(and there are pictures of him dancing as young as 4), he attributes much of his formal training to a music teacher at Northeast High School, Nevin Wasson. Mr. Wasson recognized talent when he saw it and soon had Eddie playing in school shows such as the Viking Varieties. Mr. Wasson taught Eddie the importance of learning how to play a variety of music and that was a lesson that Eddie carried with him throughout his life, playing and teaching others to play classical, jazz, rock, country & western and religious music. His belief was that if you specialized in a style or type of music and that music went out of fashion, so did your career.

At 18, Eddie began playing around the country and his fast paced style earned him the nickname "The Keyboard Atom-Splitter". But he didn't spend his entire time playing piano. He felt the call of the military and joined the army as a combat engineer. However, when you have true talent, it drives your life and he ended up in the music part of the military. He also took time off from music to marry his wife Patty and they became leaders in the Northeast community. He played piano at Budd Park Christian Church and taught Sunday school there. He was honored by the church in 2005 with an "Eddie Oyer Day". He volunteered at Glennon Nursing home and entertained the residents with his vast repertoire, playing whatever the residents requested, and usually without sheet music. That's how you can do it when you've been playing all your life.

In 2007, after 53 years of teaching both the young and the young at heart — Eddie closed his studio. But closing the studio was not the end of his contribution. He continued his activities in the community until his health required him to stop. This piece was started by talking about what an institution is made of. The definition of institution is "an organization, establishment, foundation, society, or the like, devoted to the promotion of a particular cause or program, especially one of a public, educational, or charitable character". Eddie's love of music and his devotion to sharing that love with the 1,000's of pupils that he taught over the years, along with his unfailing commitment to the community, has earned him the right to be called an "institution".

STEPHEN THACKER - Class of 1965

The NEHSAA has recognized many Notable Alumni that have had internationally significant careers. Stephen B. Thacker MD, MSc, RADM/ASG (ret.), US Public Health Service, NE Class of '65 was one such alumnus added to that list by the NEAA Board on the 50th anniversary of his NE graduation. Steve was co-valedictorian at NE, went to Princeton University, and held a medical degree from Mount Sinai School of Medicine and a master's of science from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. He did his residency at the Duke School of Medicine and then joined the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

During his service, Dr. Thacker held such CDC leadership positions as Director of the Office of Surveillance, Epidemiology, and Laboratory Services, Director of the Office of Workforce and Career Development, and Director of the Epidemiology Program Office.

In addition to these permanent appointments, Dr. Thacker served in an acting capacity at different times as Deputy Director of CDC, Director of the National Center for Environmental Health, Director of the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control, and Director of the National Center for Public Health Informatics.

Steve was known for his committed stewardship of many of CDC's flagship programs such as the Epidemic Intelligence Service. For 37 years at the CDC, Steve worked on public health issues for people across the globe as he was instrumental in launching the Field Epidemiology Training Programs in more than 35 countries around the world. His accomplishments were recognized through more than 40 major awards and commendations during his professional career. His more than 240 publications on public health will continue his influence on public health practice well into the future.

Steve's contributions were cut short at the age 65 when he died from complications of Crentzfeldt-Jakob Disease, a degenerative neurological illness that causes rapid deterioration of the brain. The naming of the Stephen B. Thacker CDC Library in Atlanta established a lasting memory of his service. The library includes the Stephen B. Thacker Legacy Exhibit which showcases the distinguished awards and investigative papers that reflect the outstanding career of this outstanding 1965 graduate of Northeast High School.

Thacker also delighted in his role as a husband, father and grandfather. He coached his daughter's high school girls' basketball team for 20 years. To acknowledge his devotion to the school, the girls' locker room at St. Pius X Catholic High School in Atlanta, GA was dedicated to Coach Thacker.

ST JOSEPH TABLE

The Gumba's are made up of the following: Sandy Jackson (guitar), Bill Jackson (accordion), Frank Ancona class of 66, Grace Ann 'Carridi' Ancona class of '70. And last but certainly not least — Mr/ James Cariddi. Mr Carriddi is another Northeast Institution — serving as a teacher, vice-principal and principal at NE Jr & NE Senior. He is still very active in the school and the community, and is treasured by all.

WHAT HAVE WE BEEN UP TO?

One of the things that I want to accomplish as president is to be more involved with the students at the school. While the Alumni board members are often asked to help out at various events — welcome back to school night, teacher parent conferences, checking in paperwork for computers, teacher appreciation bracheous, testing manifers etc., etc. — those activities didn't give me/us the interaction with the kids that I wanted. And my rescoring for wanting that interaction is two-fuld — I love being around young people, their energy, their wander at the world around them, their perspective on life and what comes next, helps take me back to my days as a student. While it's a very different world than it was when I was at Northeast — some of the challenges and the situations are the same — you know the saying "there's nothing new under the sun" and in some ways that's true of teeragers 50 years ago and teeragers today. But the other reason, and I'll admit it's the more important of the two — is because for the students to become invested in the Alumni Association, they need to meet the people and see just what we do — and why we do it. And this year, I think we've made some progress in that direction.

With the help of Ms. Carmen Treax, the school's Library Media Specialist – who organized many of the events our Alumni participated in, and Ms. Evelyn Hill – who's title as school liaison is as much of an understatement as calling a Lamberghini "just another car" – we were able to take part in artivities that let us get to know the students and the students get to know us.

So the title of this piece is "WHAT HAVE WE REEN UP TO" and the answer is lots! This year I presented a "Does for Success" workshop for some of the seniors from Ms. Lois Green's marketing class. I've presented this workshop numerous times over the years but this was the first time to high school students so had to adapt it somewhat for the audience but based on the feedback from Ms. Green, the presentation along with the handouts that detailed what we talked about – was a success. The presentation was in two parts – the first what to wear and the second – where to find cluttes that didn't break the bank. (And anyone that knows me knows what's coming next!) We covered not only what to wear but how we could shop at thrift stores to maximize our budget.

The next step after knowing what to wear on an interview is to interview, so members of the alumni along with some teachers and administrators from the school, conducted mock interviews. The students were given the job description of "customer service" along with a list of responsibilities for the job so they would have an idea of what to expect and answer accordingly. We had a prepared list of behavioral questions that the interviewer could pick from and after the interview – we critiqued the students. I think the exercise was beneficial for both the students and the alumni because it gave us more insight into what great students Northeast is producing.

Next on the agenda was "Viking Meets Viking". During a round robin style event, Alamni sat with students and talked about what it was like when they were in school and what they did after graduation. We had 5 minutes with each group and then they would move to the next Alamni table. The one thing everybody brought up when we talked about how to make it better next year - was that 5 minutes wasn't lung enough.

I chaperoned an outing to Union Station with Ms. Freeman and Ms. Hill to see the play "The Island". The apartheid-era drama, inspired by a true story, is set in an unnamed prison clearly based on South Africa's notorious Robben Island, where Nelson Mandela was held for twenty-seven years. For many of the students, it was the first time they had ever been to a play and the first time they understood what apartheid was. After the play, the students had the opportunity to ask questions of the actors and I was impressed with their willingness to show their appreciation of the actors and their performance.

The front page of the Purple and White is a speech given by Mr. Larry Cooper, this year's ROTC Battalion Commander. I had the honor of being invited to this year's JROTC inspection ceremony and I was inspired by the discipline, commitment and respect for both the uniform and the ROTC leaders - that the cadets displayed. Linda Dimon, Chapter Regent of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution - Independence Chapter awarded the prestigious JROTC Bronze Medal to Valarie Gonzales.
