#### **IS NORTHEAST HIGH SCHOOL CLOSING?**

We believe we are safe for the present time. By Helen Shores `61

As you may have heard, the Kansas City, Missouri, Board of Education developed a plan in which Northeast High School would be closed beginning with the 2026 school year. This plan is call the Blueprint 2030. Northeast would be open, but students attending NE would be from Lincoln Prep while the Lincoln building was being renovated. Northeast High School students would be attending East or Southeast High School.

While the Kansas City School District does need to make changes for its fiscal survivability, the plan met with strong opposition from parents at the nine public meetings. Nine or ten elementary and two high schools would be closed. Because of parent and alumni dissatisfaction with the plan, only two schools have been closed at this time: Longfellow and Truman Elementary Schools.

Reasons given for closing Northeast are declining enrollment with lower numbers expected in the future and low academic student performance. Future use of the building was said "to be announced." First, it is believed that the enrollment at Northeast will be up next year. And more important, student achievement numbers are increasing to the point that it has been taken off the list of schools needing improvement.

A bond issue is proposed by the School Board to finance new construction and school renovation projects. This will be a difficult goal to achieve given our economic times and disgust with the Blueprint 2030 plan. The school board is now considering two revised plans, one with and one without bond passage. At this time we do not know the details of the two plans, but hopefully neither one will involve closing Northeast.

"Thou Dear" has been an educational and societal beacon for nearly 110 years. Not only have many distinguished people graduated from NE, but the Alumni Association has partnered with the school for nearly 25 years to assist with daily supplies, academic and attendance incentives, and scholarships for future education. Your Northeast High School Alumni Association has supported the food and clothing pantry, which has served hundreds of students and families by providing money and volunteers to run the program. The closing of Northeast High School will contribute to a decline in the historically rich part of Kansas City and its future citizens.



#### "THOU DEAR" NORTHEAST HIGH SCHOOL TRIVIA

- After construction completion, NEHS was called the Jewel of the Midwest because it was far advanced from any
  other schools.
- NEHS became the largest high school in the KCMO School District and is completely fireproof.
- The entire school could be heated in 20 minutes. The air throughout the building could be changed in 8 minutes.
- All air was blown inside from enormous fans, forced through heating coils, then through a sheet of water to cleanse of impurities, then blown into the rooms creating 70 degree temperature at all times. (The school is now air conditioned.)
- The building has a 6 1/2 foot deep white tiled swimming pool with on-sight laundry for towels, bathing suits, and kitchen linens. (Not in use now.)
- All water for drinking, bathing, and swimming was filtered.
- Northeast manufactured all the soap used.
- The school had a hot air apparatus where students could dry their hair at the same time.
- The school is solid concrete with brick facades, and the roof is solid concrete slabs.
- Northeast offered complete business courses from stenography to banking.
- Northeast also offered vocational training from joinery to shop work.
- NEHS had a complete telephone system with 61 phones.
- Full courses in cooking, millinery, and dressmaking were included in the high school curriculum, including a model flat to teach all aspects of housekeeping!
- NEHS had a complete telephone system with 61 phones.
- The school had a master clock which, by compressed air sent through tubes, operated 27 other clocks and rang the program bells in the classrooms

#### FOR YOUR INFORMATION

The lack of a high school diploma is the single greatest risk factor for experiencing homelessness as a young adult. Education is going to allow a child to get a job that will provide a salary to pay for housing and food.

The Missouri school districts have identified nearly 33,000 students in the districts as unhoused in 2021. Kansas had approximately 7,000 during the 2021-2022 school year.

Homelessness is determined if the child is staying with family in a motel, car, shelter, from couch to couch or in a multiple family situation.

KCPS works with community agencies to help families find safe living arrangements, and the law requires the districts to admit the student, provide services, and equal access to education. The pantry aids in serving the students and families in need.

#### GOODBYE TO A NORTHEAST NOTABLE



CARL J. DiCAPO '44

Carl was born November 7, 1927 to Jack and Kelly DiCapo in the house at 119 N. Lawn in the Northeast area of Kansas City.

He attended and graduated from Gladstone Elementary School, Northeast High School, KC Junior College, and the University of Missouri.

Carl worked at the IRS for a few years, until his brother-in-law asked him to help out at the Italian Gardens Restaurant in 1953, and the rest is HISTORY. He spent the next 46 years, starting as Cashier, Assistant Manager, Manager, President, Chairman of the Board, Part-Owner, and then retired in 1998.

Carl was a VERY loyal Kansas Citian. His many achievements include serving on countless boards as either Director, Board Member or Officer including: Don Bosco Community Center, Missouri Restaurant Association, Ethnic Enrichment, Park Lane Hospital, Salvation Army, Park Board Commission, Native Sons and Daughters of KC, Citizens Association, KC Jazz Orchestra, JCC Metropolitan College, Crime Commission, VA Hospital, Catholic Charities of Kansas City-St. Joseph, Convention and Visitors Bureau, and Corinthian Hall.

He was most proud of the fountain named after him at Cliff Drive in the Northeast area, as well as Carl J. DiCapo Drive at Main Street from Pershing Road to the entrance of the World War I Museum.

Carl leaves behind his wife of almost 70 years, Anita "Sugie" Donnici DiCapo; three sons, Jack (Pam), John David (Julia), and Carl Michael; three granddaughters, Lauren (Luke) Marvine, Alexandra (Rishi) Patel, and Ava DiCapo; and two great granddaughters, Penelope and Mela Marvine. Also nephew, Victor Cascio and nieces, Rozanne Scimeca and Christy Hartner, for they were like his children. He also leaves many nieces and nephews, cousins, and friends.

He was truly a Northeast Viking and was elected a Northeast Notable some years ago He is admired and held in high esteem by the Northeast High School Alumni Board of Directors, as he was always there when we needed to consult him. Carl was one of the original founders of the Alumni Association, and we shall miss him.

#### THE VIKING VILLAGE PANTRY

The pantry was busy during the last few months. We see approximately 50-100 families a month. These families can come from our own school family, but they also come from families from our feeder schools or even other schools in the district. Often a school will not have a pantry, but the school clinician will reach out to us to help a family in need.

As a member of SchoolSmartKC, we tried to use our grant wisely but still had to spend our money. We reached out to the KCPS Foundation, who helped us through this school year, but that has now ended.

Northeast was chosen to be this year's Summer Academy. We saw many students who did not have pantries at their schools. We made sure that students were aware that they were our students for the summer. Summer Academy had its own clinician who was asked multiple times to deliver to a student's home, if they were unable to carry the box on the bus.

Through your generosity, the Viking Village Pantry has a growing reputation for being something that other schools replicate. This summer alone, we visited with or were visited by staff from not only KCPS but by Charter schools throughout the city.

The pantry has been asked to include servicing the Northeast Middle School need, and will do so at the start of the year. The Middle School, in appreciation, has donated a substantial amount of money to help with the increase in students.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our volunteers. A list that continues to grow. I'd like to especially thank the men who come in to do the heavy work. They often sneak in to put something together for us, or take it apart, or move it, or dispose of it, pack it, and especially drive it from point A to B, C, D, and often E. We hope you know your help is invaluable to us.

To my ladies, Thank you! To Karen Laughlin'68 our special thanks for your generosity and donation of \$3,000 and for your plan to establish a scholarship in your sister's name. As always, we appreciate donations of clothing, especially sports clothing and larger men's sizes. Another reminder to clean out your home pantries; we can always find needy homes.

#### NORTHEAST INFORMATION

There are six neighborhoods in Northeast Kansas City, Missouri—Pendleton Heights, Scarritt Renaissance, Indian Mound, Sheffield, Lykins, and Independence Plaza—dating back to the 1800's. Columbus Park has also been included because, although it is separated from Northeast by highways, the same resilience is found there.

There are 105,579 residents in Northeast Kansas City, with a median age of 34. Of this, 48.97% are males and 51.03% are females. US-born citizens make up 91.66% of the residential pool in Northeast Kansas City, while non-US-born citizens account for 5.27%. Additionally, 3.07% of the population is represented by non-citizens.

A row of vintage houses sits north of the Kansas City Museum. One at 3400 Norledge Avenue was built of limestone in 1899 and was home to the daughter of Nathan Scarritt, a Methodist minister who owned much of the property in Scarritt Renaissance in the mid 1800's. Near the house is Scarritt Point, where Scarritt's log cabin once stood.

Following Gladstone south toward St. John Avenue, you'll come upon a historic landmark known as The Colonnade. It was built in 1908 and designed by Henry Wright, a city planner who wanted to map out communities around "largely undeveloped, wild, or agricultural land surrounding or neighboring urban areas."

As for The Colonnade, the structure was built in the Beaux-Arts style of architecture, known for its distinct focus on symmetry, classical details, stone, statues and fountains and long hallways supported by arches or arcades.

#### **SCHOLARSHIPS**

This year we took a high tech approach to scholarships. The scholarship committee worked with the school scholarship college prep advisors to change our approach to scholarships. Everything we did was done online and was open to all seniors and graduating juniors.

Our approach to the process was to try to follow the path of national scholarship programs. We were led in the process by Ayanna Casteneda, HDF Family College Prep Program, and Breonna Taylor, KCPS College Specialist. With their help, we determined what was the necessary student info we needed now from our student applicants, and what we could get from other sources at a later date. It ended with us having a clear application that was easy for us and our student body. It automatically fed to a spreadsheet that made it easy for us to work from. It was available to each member of the committee and could be viewed by multiple people at any time.

Scholarships opened at the beginning of 2nd semester and closed two months later, leaving the committee plenty of time to process the chore ahead of us. Because of the shortened, and clear application, we were able to tweak the work ahead of time instead of getting it all at one time. We got an application one day, maybe the essay a month later. It meant we could take time to process what we were seeing.

Our next step was the evaluation by each of us of the information provided on the application and their essays. Every member had the choice of reading all the material online or by printing it out. Our final step was the interview. We had 9 applicants who were interviewed by 5 of us. Each student was given 20 minutes and each committee member asked them 3 questions. Questions ranged from their essays to more personal questions regarding their goals and experiences.

We were joined by SFC Jerry Lewis, instructor extraordinaire. He was gracious enough to join us in interviewing all the candidates. Upon the retirement of SFC Lewis and Colonel Hilliard, the Board of Directors voted to create a JROTC scholarship in their names. It was an honor to have him interview the candidates for that scholarship.

The scholarship winners were Amy Duong, Ar Min Do La, Bryce Stivers-Abbott (JROTC scholarship), Gino Morales (Markey Peters scholarship), Monica Aguilar, Sa Ki Da (Rodina Kids scholarship), Sha Ban Bi (Tracy Gail Weber scholarship), Wendy Munoz, and Esperance Bigirimana (Barbara Blair Fanara scholarship.)

Sixteen thousand dollars was awarded to these worthy students. Scholarships were announced at a senior celebration and acknowledged during graduation. Scholarship funds will be mailed to the school of their choice, and will be there prior to the start of their collage experience.

We wish them all success and look forward to applauding their accomplishments.
