I'm excited to tell you more about our KSHB 41 Gift of Sole Gala, on Saturday, October 21, 2023, from 6pm to 11pm, at The Abbott, 1901 Cherry Street, KCMO. It's a classy, fun, inspiring gathering of people who understand the importance of letting our young people, facing challenging circumstances, know we care and we're doing something to help them. Tickets are \$150 each, or you can be a table-sponsor at \$2,500 (table of 10)

The Gala is the big finale to a week-long on-air campaign asking KSHB 41 viewers to donate money so children in financially struggling families will get a new pair of sneakers! KSHB 41 Anchor, Kevin Holmes, started this event because of his experiences when he was a teenager wearing shabby sneakers on the basketball court.

At the Gala guests will dress-up in their glitz and glam and wear their favorite pair of sneakers! We had so much fun last year; and this year is even better. We're having a formal dinner prepared by the Chef at Lula Southern Cookhouse, at your reserved table. There's an open bar and live entertainment–plus the inspiring moments to tell the stories of teenagers who received the sneakers and what it meant to them. Keep your wallet handy because we're going to have some live and silent auction items that you simply can't live without.

Our beneficiary schools this year are Wyandotte High School in KCK, and **Northeast High School** in KCMO. We'll provide sneakers for Sophomore students at those schools. KC Urban Ranger Corp participants will also receive a new pair of sneakers. Depending on how much money we raise, we'll also help Police Athletic Leagues in the area and scholarship students participating in KC Sports Commission summer camps.

VIKINGS FOREVER!

NO, WALT DISNEY DID NOT ATTEND NORTHEAST!

For the record, Walt Disney did not attend Northeast; however, he did have close connections. There are connections to two famous alumni who did attend. And this is their story.

On Facebook there are many pages and writers you can enjoy. One I enjoy is all about Walt Disney. Every day there are stories about his time in Marceline, Missouri; Kansas City; California; Florida; etc. There are also wonderful stories about his friends, family, business partners, and creative associates. They frequently mention our Northeast connection. Those are the ones I most enjoy, as our own Alumni Archives include stories of at least two Northeast alumni.

No, neither of them is Walt Disney. Walt Disney's business partner in Kansas City was Ubbe Iwerks, an alumni of NE. The story is they met at the Kansas City Star. Disney left the Star to form Laugh-O-Gram at thirty-first and Troost. Disney, and Iwerks joined him as chief animator.. Disney then went to California where the streets were paved in gold. He called Ubbe to come to California, and the rest is history. Ubbe's granddaughter, a documentarian, wrote both a book and produced a documentary about her grandfather, The Hand Behind the Mouse. Ubbe was responsible for the distinctive style of the earliest Disney animated cartoons, and was also responsible for designing Mickey Mouse

The other, my favorite, is Charles "Ducky" Nash. Mr. Nash is actually a graduate of Northeast. Many stories of Mr. Nash appeared in our school newspapers around that time. They read like he was a rascal. He played the harmonica, was able to throw voices, etc. And talking about voices, Mr. Nash was both the voice of Clarabelle the Cow AND the voice of the beloved Donald Duck. His last performance was as Donald in Mickey's Christmas Carol. On December 12, 1954 he was on What's my Line.

Charles and his wife's gravestone is a heart with Donald and Daisy Duck on it. How sweet and deserving of his legcy. We plan to have ongoing information about Northeast Alumni in the Purple & White News; after all, we have 110 years of stories about the school, the students, and the resident ghost....stay tuned!

PANTRY & CLOTHES CLOSET By Pat McCollum Roberts `59

Come visit our Northeast Food and Clothing Pantry located on the first floor in the former art room! We alumni volunteers are ready and waiting for students, teachers, families, and other visitors from 10:00 to 2:00 on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays.

We love to see students and families come in to shop from our selection of clothing and accessories plus lots of miscellaneous, everything from hairbrushes to shoes. Donations and thrift store purchases keep us supplied. One of our favorite thrift stores is Red Racks. They have a Sunday sale of everything with a certain color tag for 75 cents. If you go early, you get the best clothing, even some new with the tags on them. Goodwill's sale day is Wednesday at \$1.79 each. This year we've found another great bargain store in Claycomo and other locations in and around Kansas City called Retail Rebel. Getting the clothes ready for our students and families keeps us always sorting, separating by size, putting on hang tags, hanging on racks, and folding the rest to put in large plastic bins on tables or on shelves. Students can use their break time as quickly as possible and get to their next class on time. If we're asked for certain items and sizes and don't have what they need, we get their information and go thrift shopping!

The past few years we have increased our supply of infant, toddler, and older children's clothing, and our volunteers have added items including some toys, books, dolls, learning games, and wooden puzzles. When families come to the pantry with children, we pick out something for them. Sports clothing is hung on a rack by itself, and it goes pretty fast. On the thrift store special sale days they usually have a lot of sports items, especially hoodies, which we get a lot of requests for. Recently one of our alumni gave us some great men's clothes and several pairs of size 15 like-new athletic shoes. We lined them up under a table, and when Coach came into the pantry, he was asked if he had any students who wore size 15. As he looked down at them he said, "I know just the students who can wear those."

Prom has been one of our biggest projects for a few years. Miss Roberta would lead some of our volunteers to a church in Lee's Summit, which gave us hundreds of beautiful, very expensive dresses, short and long, some with the new tags on them. We filled two double racks with them and filled another rack with men's suits, dress shirts, slacks, and sports coats. This year there were not many students requesting clothes for the Prom, so we have only a small rack filled with those. There are also two racks of men's and women's dress clothes, which students choose for job interviews, school events, and other special occasions.

We're still receiving boxes of donations of new clothing items—coats, socks, knit caps, gloves, underwear, and more.

Thank you so much to all our friends, classmates, and anyone who has donated clothing to the pantry so we can continue to provide for school students and the community.

THIS IS THE STORY OF THE FIRST GOLF TOURNAMENT

We wanted to make money, but keep our costs down. We found our location, Shamrock CC with a good price. We made a flyer and wrote an article ready for the Northeast News and businesses in the Northeast community. We contacted people from earlier classes and started getting ready to play golf!

We got beer donated from County Beverage by The Pizzichino Family, and Tony Vig made and cooked Italian sausage. After the last group got in, we couldn't find him. He had passed out by his cooker.

We ended the night with a little excitement, a golf cart ran into the corner of the building knocking down a pole, and running into one of our golfers, breaking his leg.

The party was over, and a good time was had by all (except the broken leg guy), and money was made.

Here are a few facts about our thirty-three years:

- Courses we have played—Shamrock Hills, Lee's Summit, Teetering Rock, Raytown, Paradise Point, Smithville, Bent Oak, Oak Grove, and Adams Pointe, in Blue Springs, MO.
- There is a plaque in the Alumni Room showing the winners of the tournaments.
- The most important thing is the money this tournament has generated in its thirty-three years, \$430,000 for scholarships, teams, and our alumni association.

Our hope is that we can keep it strong. Getting your family members to become partners in this event as players, sponsors, donating if you can't attend, or donors of raffle items will keep this tournament going. THOMAS D. BARR `47

Submitted by John R. Praeger, Attorney At Law, and fellow graduate of the NE class of 1947. Here is his letter to the Alumni Association.

Dear Madam President,

I recall during my last visit to Northeast, that there is, or was, a room at the school which contained newspaper clippings and memorabilia of some of the more famous alumni of Northeast. If that is still there, I have enclosed some articles and the obituary from the New York Times about Thomas D. Barr, my friend and fellow graduate in the Northeast class of 1947.

Upon graduation, Tom attended Kansas City University and then Yale Law School, and then started his law practice with Cravath, Swaine & Moore, a large New York law firm. The enclosed articles referred to several very large and important law suits in which Tom was the lead attorney.

I last saw Tom at our 40th reunion, while we were both active in our respective practices.

Below are excerpts from The New York Times, dated Sunday, April 7, 1991

- Best known for representing IBM in a 13-year antitrust battle with the federal government, which claimed that the company had monopolized the computer business. This case in all of its facets was the first of the real megacases. The case generated 66 million pages of documents and hundreds of depositions, and it was the first to use computers to organize and search all of that paper. Time magazine called it "the case of the century" in 1979, 10 years after it was filed and in the midst of a five-year trial in which the defense eventually called 856 witnesses. The government dropped the case in 1982, on the same day that it announced the agreement that would break up AT&T. The different outcomes in the two cases warranted banner headlines.
- Mr. Barr also represented Time magazine in its defense of a libel suit in 1983 brought by Ariel Sharon, the Israeli military officer and politician, whom Time magazine had accused of complicity in a massacre in a refugee camp. Mr. Barr won the case, barely. The jury said Time had the story wrong but that it had not done so intentionally.
- In his four decades at Cravath, Mr. Barr also represented the Oneida Indian Nation of New York in its efforts to reclaim tribal land; the FDIC in its suit against Drexel Burnham Lambert; and bondholders in the default of the Washington Public Power Supply System.

"Winning was important to Tom, very important. He was very competitive. But it was actually more important to him that the work be done as well as it possibly could be done than it was to win," said Evan R. Chesler. Mr. Chesler worked on the IBM case with Mr. Barr.

SUDDENLY BUSSED TO NE IN THE 70's

We were recently contacted by Sam Wiggins, who attended Northeast from 1977-79. He was searching for pieces of his past experiences of being bussed to NE. He inquired about a picture of himself that his brother had told him appeared in the KC Star newspaper, leading an ROTC parade. Upon searching, he could not even find a picture of himself in the yearbooks pertaining to those years. After speaking to our head Detective, Roberta Holt-Kipper `69, and hearing about Sam, the search began. A conversation between Sam, Roberta, and me led us to some interesting insight from a then young black student's perspective. Here is Sam's story. (We have not yet found his picture, but are still researching.) This is one of several emails from Sam to Roberta and me.

"As I logged into the many yearbooks from 1977 thru 1979, I saw some familiar faces, all but one, mine.

I remember growing up in the Kansas City metro area and attending predominately (Negro) schools. Then one year, all of a sudden, based on your address, you were forced to ride a bus to Northeast High School. I remember the feeling of anticipation, wanting to show how smart you were, how talented you were, and above all, how equal I was to those students on the east side of town.

I sat here today at the age of 63 and cried, knowing that I and many others were so miseducated back then; simply put, marginalized. Had it not been for the bussing I would've never known how big the world was. I would eventually drop out in my senior year and joined the Army.

My brother told me many years ago that he saw me leading a parade in the KC Star newspaper while in a JROTC uniform. I remembered that parade when I was at Northeast High School. I couldn't find any photos of me, but I did of the Sergeant Major, and the assistant Sergeant First Class. Those photos were precious because those two men opened their hearts and welcomed us rag tag bunch of junior officers with big afros and superior drill skills.

I went on to retire from the Army after several wars and many worldly travels." By Samuel Wiggins who wanted to share and shed light on how far Kansas City Public Schools have progressed.

Editor's note: Sam now resides in Glen Burnie, Maryland. His home during high school was 2227 Tracy, KCMO. We will continue our conversations with Sam and wish him the best. I told Roberta, this is what it is all about, and why we do what we do. How nice to see a glimpse from the past with a positive result.

At the 2023 Mattie Rhodes Center Annual meeting, held on November 15, NEHS graduate Larry Cooper was installed as one of 5 incoming new MRC Board of Directors. The installation ceremony was held following a superb Mexican Buffet Dinner served by members and volunteers of Mattie Rhodes. The 5 incoming board members took the MRC pledge.

"I promise to do all I can to help the needy and suffering by working for them, learning about them, giving for them, and trying to interest others in them." A video was then viewed by those in attendance with a brief historical accounting of the founding of Mattie Rhodes. Board Chair, Rigo Jurado followed with an explanation of the name of Mattie Rhodes Center. In the late 1800s a determined teenager named Mattie Rhodes gathered several friends to help her feed the needy and suffering, and to learn about the circumstances which placed them in jeopardy of homelessness and starvation. Mattie died early in 1890 at the age of 19 and left \$500 to be used for establishing a safe place for those in need. Thus, Mattie Rhodes became the name of the three community centers in Kansas City, Missouri: 148 N. Topping in the northeast district, 915 West 17th Street on the west side of Kansas City, and 1701 Jarboe. The areas serve bilingual students and families of KCMO. In addition, there are 3 satellite offices.

Congratulations to Larry Cooper, who says he is extremely honored to serve in this position.
