Contrary to the belief of the inmates of Northeast Penitentiary, life does continue in the outside world. During this past prison term many good and bad things have happened. The most well remembered things will probably be the 444 days that 52 Americans spent in Iran while being held as hostages and accused of being spies. Not many will forget the outrage and frustration that they felt during the crisis. The most jubilant point of their incarceration would be the time that Reagan took office. For two weeks prior to the swearing in of the new President, frantic efforts were made to release the hostages. On Jan. 18, it was announced to the press that the Iranian and American Governments had reached an agreement on the release of the hostages. By 3 pm. the issues were totally completed, and by 8:30 am. all the money transactions were done. There should have been no hold up on releasing the hostages, but for reasons unknown to us the Iranians did not release the hostages until just moments after President Ronald Reagan took office.

When the hostages came home they were met by thousands of fellow Americans and yellow ribbons. They appreciated the welcome but said that they were not the heroes, but that the eight Americans that tried to rescue them and died, were the real heroes.

After three years of playing the New York Yankees for the American League Championship the Royals were able to beat the Yankees in a four day shut out. They then went on to play in their first World Series, playing excellently and losing after seven tough days of playing.

Kansas City will also remember this as being the year that George Brett hit 400, although he was unable to hold that average to the end of the season.

This past year has proven that the Kansas City sport teams are out to win. With the Royals playing in the World Series, the Chiefs losing out on the Super Bowl by one game, and the Kings having the chance to play in the league championship. Go K.C.

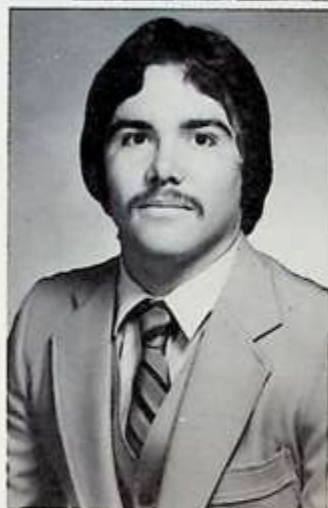


finally shaping up. We started considering other people's feelings-we weren't so self-centered anymore.

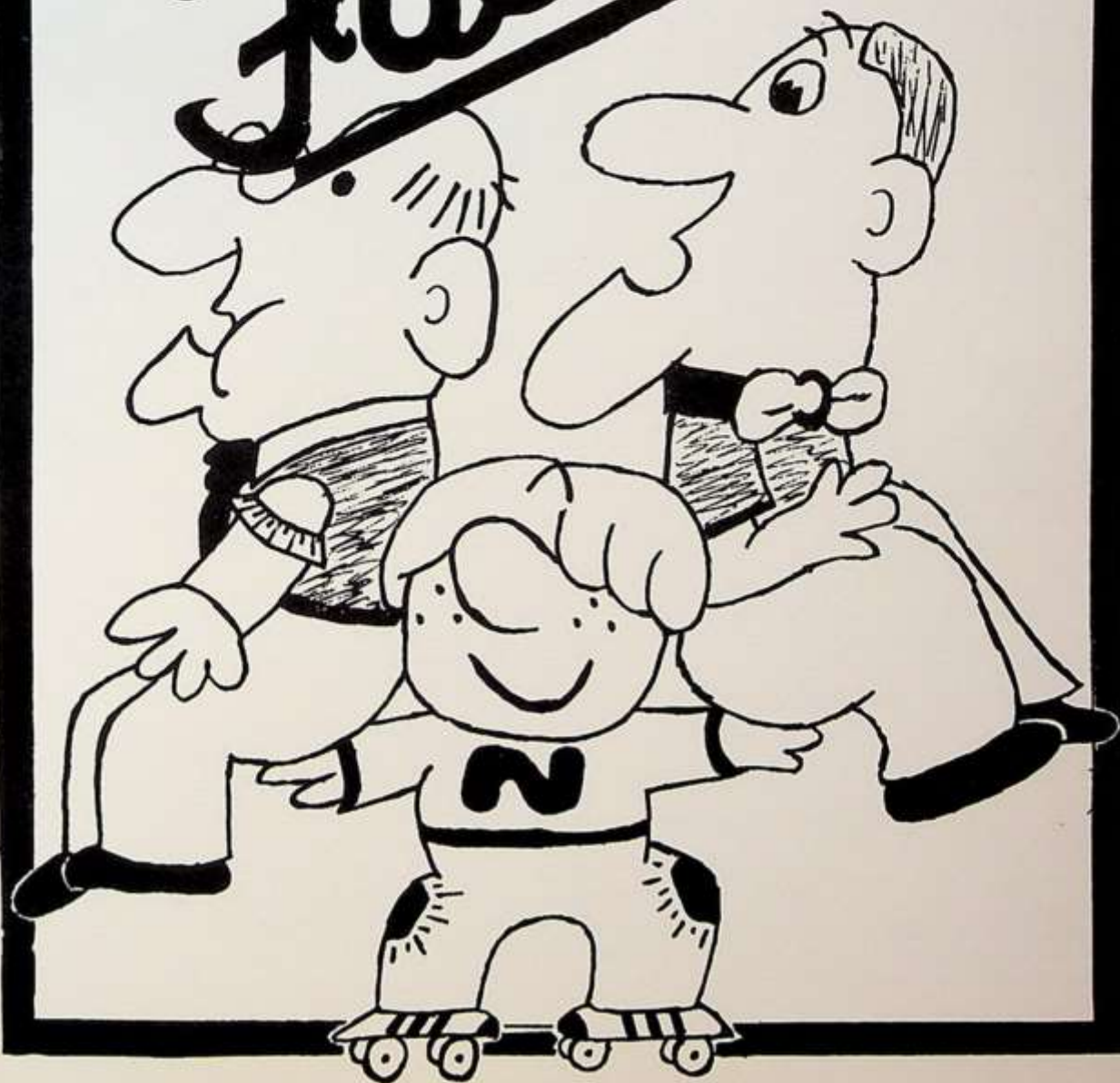

THE WARDEN

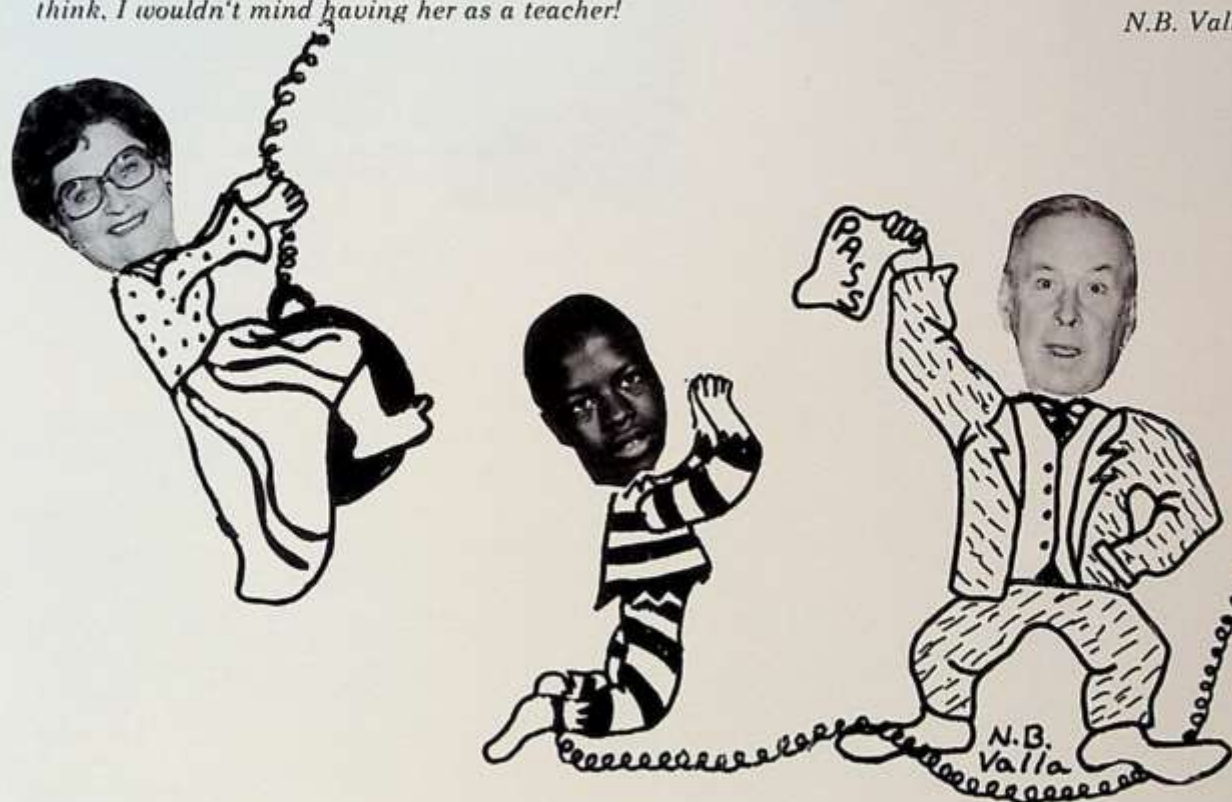

STOOLIES

Office Help



A Stoolie (Office Help) works closely with the Parole Officers, Social Workers, or the Hit Men. Each Stoolie has her or his own job of gathering needed information on other prisoners, for their employer.

A Stoolie is paid various amounts for the information collected. The cost relies on how risky the job may be. For instance: finding out what a prisoner does on his spare time, may cost anywhere from two hall passes, to one free lunch. But if a Stoolie has to testify against a prisoner, it may cost between two sick leave passes, or three points for parole.

No matter what the job is the Stoolies are obligated to do their job, even though they are volunteers. Each Stoolie works hard so that she or he can one day be considered a real person.

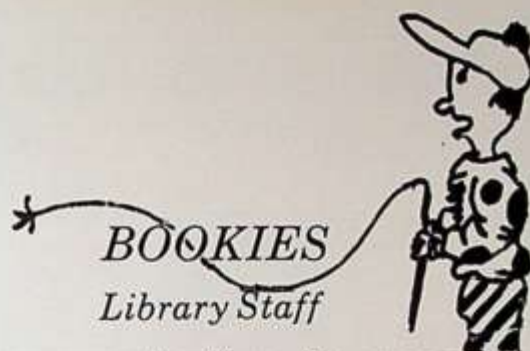

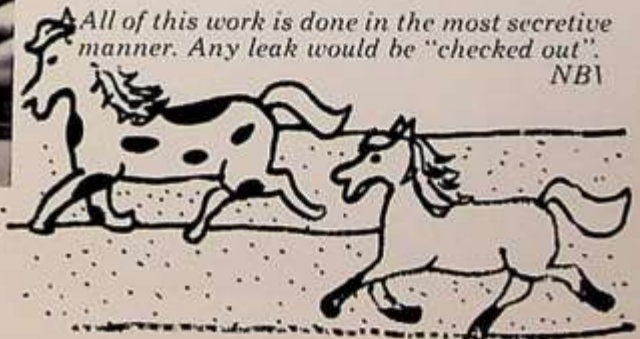


We have uncovered evidence that exposes the "Bookies" of Northeast Penitentiary. For a long time, the employees of the pen have often thought, that the room called the "Library" was of educational value for the prisoners. In real life, the prisoners have set up a "Dial a Bet Gambling Center."

This operation is highly technical, but we have revealed how it works. A prisoner will ask to go to the Library, so that he can learn about plants, the earth, architecture or some other hard to believe topic. He gets a pass to leave his Cell Block. On his way down to the "Library", he counts his money, to see exactly how much money he can bet on the horse of his choice. When he enters the Center, he immediately goes to the Index Files to see which horses are running. He writes down the number of the horse he

likes, and then finds the book with the same number. He looks through the book and calculates the horse's odds of winning. If he decides to bet on that horse, he brings*the book to the Gambling Counter and gives it, with his GC (Gambling Card), to the Bookie. (some prisoners prefer to take the book to their Cell, so they can study it more thoroughly.) The Bookie then puts the card into a computer where the prisoners credentials are registered. This computer sends sound waves up to the third floor and into what is known as the "Bookroom". This is where the "Book Keepers" look through their books to find the information that is needed. the information is sent back down to the Bookies and if it is positive, the prisoner may place his bet. After he places his bet, the prisoner goes back to his cell and waits for the results.

All of this work is done in the most secretive manner. Any leak would be "checked out".

Solitary Confinement, (Student Adjustment Center), is often referred to as the SAC Room. A Nor'Easter member tried to attend one of these supposedly disciplinary sessions, but her plans were terminated by an unidentified "Hit Man" that entered the scene. The information collected below is from citizens who wish to inform the public of actions like these. The SAC Room is for prisoners who have difficulty adjusting to prison life. By the words "difficulty adjusting", I mean, circumstances such as: mass absenteeism, unable to identify with other prisoners (which in result causes disagreements harmful to the human body), and other rude, crude and socially unacceptable actions. The prisoners who are in the

SAC Room, are assigned work from each of his officers and confined to this four-walled asylum all day, with the "exception" of lunch. An officer was asked how he thought the prisoners were treated in the SAC Room. The anonymous person replied, "Something nice must be there, or they wouldn't keep coming back." This possibly could be the reason why rumor has it that the series of padded cells, containing water beds, AM/FM stereo's champagne and caviar is the perfect environment for prisoners to do work that needs to be done.

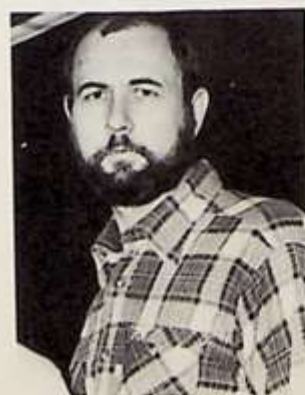

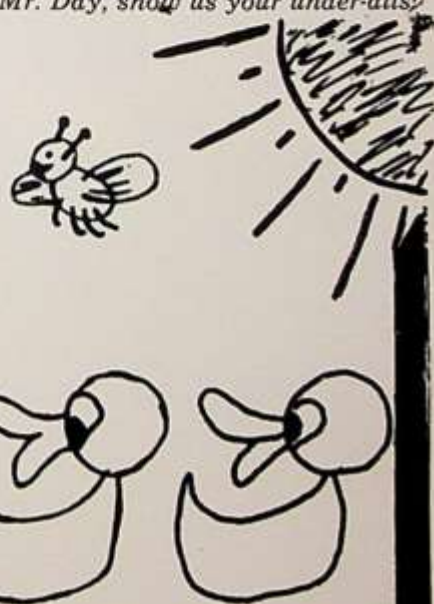

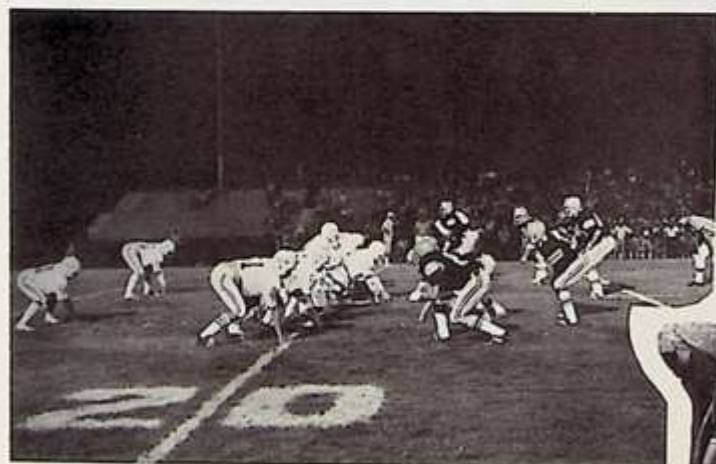

Cross Country is a type of long-distance racing. Unlike track and field races cross-country competition is not held on a track. Runners usually race across fields or golf courses and often through woods and over hills. Because distances and terrains differ for each race. United States, the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations has set a minimum distance of 1½ miles and a maximum distance of 3 miles for races. The National Collegiate Athletic Association and the Amateur Athletic Union have set a 3-mile minimum and a 7-mile maximum for cross-country esp. in high schools and colleges.



For the past 4 years our Cross country team has been steadily becoming better and achieving more. This year they went all the way. The picture to the left shows us that this is true. This was taken at the Interscholastic League meet in which they took first place for the first time in Cross Country history. Our J.V. girls team also took first place in this meet. These two teams were the first to win a first place trophy in the league since 1974.

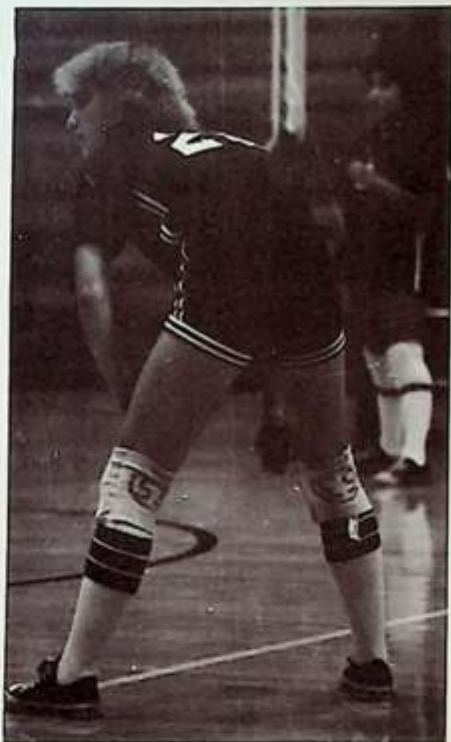
VOLLEYBALL

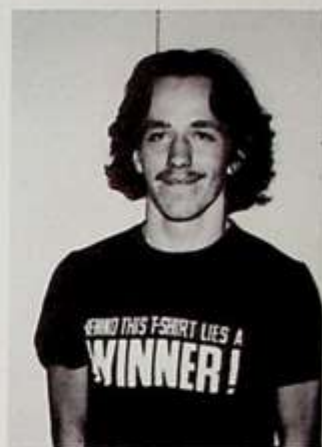

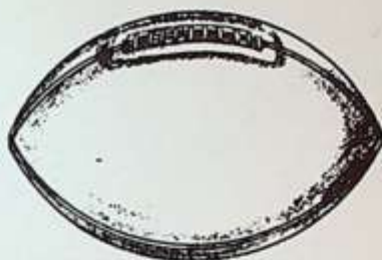

Football is an ancient sport. A game called harpaston was played by the Spartans as early as 500 B.C. In this game a ball was kicked, passed, or carried across the opponents' goal line. Strikingly similar to a modern football was the follis, used in Roman games. It was made of leather and inflated with air, but it evidently was propelled by foot, not by hand and arm. The sport began to take definite form at boys' schools in England. Some even drew up rules. These allowed the ball to be kicked, but not carried, toward the goal. One November afternoon in the year 1823, a player at Rugby, a Famous boys' school in England, cheated on a football game. He carried the ball across the goalline. Even though the score was not counted, this event started the Rugby football which the American game is directly descended.

By 1863 the new game of Rugby had become very popular and is now enjoyed by millions of people.

Although our defense was up to par, the Patriots made a successful attempt at a field goal during the second quarter with 2 minutes to go till halftime.



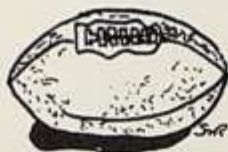

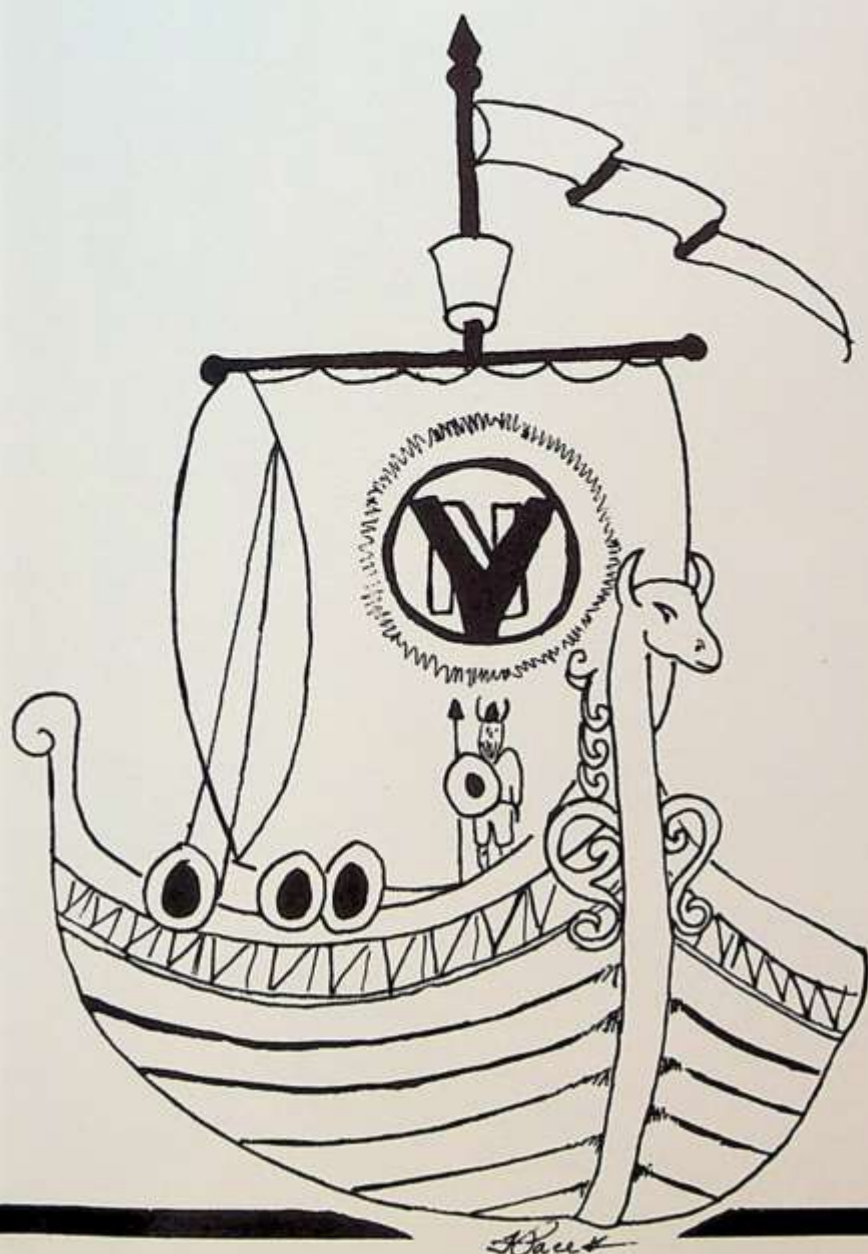
Eighty Two

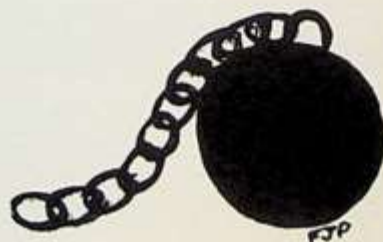

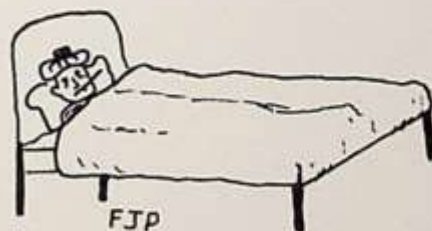

James A. Naismith invented basketball in 1891. Naismith was a physical-education instructor at the International YMCA Training School. He was asked to create a team sport that could be played indoors during the winter. Naismith formed 13 basic rules for the game and then asked a janitor to nail two boxes to the gymnasium balcony to be used as goals. But the janitor could find only some half-bushel baskets which Naismith accepted. The sport thus became known as basketball. In December 1891, Naismith's physical-education class played the first basketball game. The class had 18 men, and so each team had 9 players. They used a soccer ball and, in spite of much running and shooting, the players scored only one basket in the game. Word of the new game spread quickly, and basketball was soon being played by many groups. Naismith published his original 13 rules for the game in the YMCA Training School newspaper on Jan. 15, 1892. But many groups established their own rules and were still played by them as late as 1915. That year, various rule-making groups met and developed a standard set of basketball rules. Many changes such as the baskets, balls, backboards, and the rules brought about the exciting game of basketball.

Diana Geary sparks Vikings' victory over East in District 15 semifinals



Geary, a 5-foot-6 senior, ranks in the top 10 in four of the league's six individual categories.

Besides being the third-leading scorer with a 19.3 average, Geary is ninth in rebounding with 11 a game. She's seventh in field-goal shooting at 41.2 percent, making 40 of 97 attempts. Geary is fifth in free-throw shooting at 64.3 percent, making 36 of 56 attempts.

Against East the last time, Geary scored a career-high 36 points. This time, the Bears used a man-to-man defense that shut down Geary's scoring. So she had 14 rebounds instead.
