NEW ALUMNUS ADDED TO LIST OF NORTHEAST NOTABLES

It's always exciting when your school produces a star, whether it's a classmate who becomes a politician or the basketball MVP who hits the big time. Being able to say, "I knew him/her when!" about a Notable Alumnus is a wonderful feeling.

A Notable Alumnus is someone who has graduated from a school and gone on to achieve remarkable, extraordinary, or distinguished accomplishments that garner the attention of others.

Stephen (Steve) Daleo, a member of the class of 1974, is the latest alumnus to be inducted into the Northeast High School Alumni Association's list of Northeast Notables.

After graduating from Northeast High School in 1974, Steve attended the University of Missouri, where he earned both a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Science in Electrical Engineering. He began his career in Research and Development of medical devices shortly after graduation.

In 1979, Steve started his engineering career with the Bendix Corporation, where he worked as a Design Engineer responsible for evaluating the performance of semiconductor devices. His subsequent career included positions at various companies:

- DIT-MCO International, where he served as Product Manager and Senior Engineer.
- PPG Biomedical, where he was responsible for design and project management for cardiac catheterization, electrophysiology, and patient monitoring systems.
- Tyco/Mallinckrodt/Nellcor, which facilitated his move from Missouri to California, where he held the role of Staff Program Manager and Hardware Manager.
- TheraSense, where he developed blood glucose monitoring instruments for diabetics.
- OptiScan Biomedical, where he designed a glucose measurement system for diabetes.
- Sanarus Medical, where he was the Director of Systems Engineering, focusing on devices for the diagnosis and treatment of benign and malignant breast tumors.

Throughout his career, Steve was awarded three patents for his designs of medical equipment. In addition to his various roles, he served as President of Daleo Enterprises, LLC, consulting with various companies on medical device design. He was also the national importer for two hang gliding companies: Flight Design and Aeros.

Steve was an avid hang gliding pilot, flying for over 32 years and achieving the rating of Master. He also held an Aerotow Pilot rating and a private pilot's license. His passions included flying, his work, his family and friends, great wine, and life itself.

Tragically, Steven Daleo passed away on October 28, 2006, while doing what he loved—piloting an ultra-light plane. He had borrowed an open-cockpit Moyes Dragonfly ultra-light plane from a friend but experienced undiagnosed issues during takeoff from a private airstrip and crashed into a field.

Steve was most proud of the work he did designing a device for breast cancer diagnosis and treatment.

The Northeast High School Alumni Association is proud to call Stephen Daleo a Northeast Notable.

AN OUT OF THIS WORLD ALUMNUS

What does it take to become an astronaut? And what does it take to put a person into space and bring him home safely? While Northeast cannot yet claim an astronaut, we do have an alumnus who worked on the Apollo space program and the Skylab Space Station putting men into space and sending them to the moon.

Richard Irwin, a graduate of 1960, never thought that one day he would be helping put a man on the moon. Irwin attended Gladstone Elementary, Northeast Junior and Senior High Schools. After graduation he worked several jobs in the Kansas City area before going to Long Beach City College. He continued his education back at Kansas City Junior College in 1962. Deciding to go into engineering, he attended the University of Illinois and received a Bachelor's degree in Aeronautical Astronautical Engineering.

In 1966 Richard married the love of his life, Karen McKee also a 1960 Northeast graduate, and the couple moved to Long Beach, California. He had been hired by McDonnell-Douglas to work in the space division. The company had designed and built the third stage of the Saturn V rocket for the Apollo moon program. Richard's assignment was in the rocket propulsion section. The thruster group was responsible for all external movements of the third stage. The goal was to put an Apollo command module into earth's orbit, then into a translunar trajectory to escape the earth's gravity. The Apollo 7 command and service module was the first manned earth-orbit vehicle in a program which would later put a man on the moon in 1969 with the Apollo 11.

Karen Irwin was also hired by McDonnell-Douglas and worked as a Technical Illustration Division for nine years. She left when they started a family of three boys, Steven, Brian, and Dan. She later went to work in the insurance industry. In 1969 Richard earned his pilot's license and he and Karen flew back to Kansas City to attend their tenth Northeast High School reunion.

In 1973 Richard moved to a new group within the space division, the Skylab Space Station, which was the forerunner of the International Space Station. This module would hold three astronauts and Richard was on the team responsible for the thruster systems which would control all exterior positioning movements for the space station. The Skylab backup can now be seen in the Smithsonian at the Aerospace Museum.

Karen and Richard moved from Belmont Shores to Irvine, California in 1974. They also spent much time at their second home in Palm Desert Greens beginning in 1978.

Richard began part-time work in the insurance industry in 1976 and in 1978 left McDonnell-Douglas to work in insurance full-time. He became District Manager for Family Life and continued with AIG. Karen and Richard moved to Platte City in 2017. Karen McKee Irwin passed away in 2023.

Richard received many awards and recognition for his work in the space program. When he left McDonnell-Douglas, he was the section manager of the Environmental Control and Power Plant Administration. He has very interesting stories to tell and would love to share them with anyone. He is an excellent example of what you can achieve when you work hard toward a goal and apply yourself.

Northeast High School welcomes Roosevelt Gipson, aka Coach Rosey. Coach Rosey is a native of Kansas City and 2008 graduate of Hogan Prep Academy at 1331 E. Meyer in Kansas City, Missouri where he was a three sport athlete participating in football, wrestling and track & field. After graduation, he attended the University of Central Missouri in Warrensburg (UCM). His senior year, he took on double duty by returning to the Hogan Rams as an assistant football coach while completing his studies at UCM. More recently Coach Rosey expanded his coaching resume at Park Hill South.

Coach is a family man, sharing his homelife with wife Tabitha, daughter Zuri (3) and son Royal (1).

Coach has a deep conviction to his student-athletes, putting lots of emphasis on the student aspect. His focus is on creating a positive culture at Northeast. Commitment, Loyalty and a mindset to “Don’t Quit” are not just on field traits, but life changing traits Coach is instilling in his players. He tells them to “Embrace the hard stuff”. Team awards this season will be recognized by stickers on the players helmets. When you attend Viking games, look for the stickers on their helmets. Individuals will be recognized for classroom achievement. The entire team will be recognized for on field success.

This is Coach Rosey’s first year as a head coach. He’s supported by Athletic Director Mariccia Spearman-Kaki and a small, but talented staff of assistants coaches, Raymond Hairston (coaching receivers and defensive backs), Jordan Carrick (running backs and corners), Jailen Jones (quarterbacks), Anthony Winters (offensive line), Carnell King (defensive line) and Ethan Robertson (special teams). Coach Rosey praised the solidarity of his coaching staff with coach Hairston bringing both continuity and a legacy from his prior coaching at Northeast and the other coaches from their past experience both playing with and coaching with Coach Rosey.

The Viking Football Team has been hard at it all summer, 3 days a week either on the field or in the weight, room preparing for the 2025 Fall Season. Please support Coach Rosey and our Vikings this season by attending one or more games. Show them your Viking Spirit! The Homecoming Game on Sept 26 vs KIPP KC is not only a great game to attend, but Northeast grads from all Alumni classes ending in “5” (i.e. 1975 celebrating their 50th reunion, 55, 65 85, 95, 05 and 15) will be recognized at halftime.

Meet Julie and Lisa Rojas - The Rojas Twins - Northeast Class of 2022

Both received scholarships from the NE Alumni Association

I'm Julie Rojas. I'll graduate from Cottey College in 2026. Cottey is an independent, liberal arts and sciences women's college in Nevada, Missouri. I chose Cottey for their education program, their small class sizes, and for how close it was to home. Some of my favorite memories from Cottey are the class discussions, the traditions the school has, meeting new people from different cultures and backgrounds, and being able to travel nationally and internationally.

My favorite class had to be Civil Rights and how it was taught from a different perspective, starting from an early time (1860s-modern times), and how it emphasizes the importance of studying a longer civil rights movement. Another class that was impactful was Modern Political Resolutions, learning about how and why people choose to revolt, whether they wanted to or not.

I have always wanted to be a teacher since I was a kid. I never knew what I wanted to teach until I went into middle school. At Northeast, I had two amazing teachers that pointed me into the direction of history, and then, going into high school, having my teachers really pushed me into becoming a history teacher. They

gave me so many opportunities to grow and find my footing as someone who wanted to become a teacher. I was able to work with my peers and be hands-on with teaching them. I was also able to see the ins and outs of being a teacher, seeing what they would do during their planning period, and seeing how they interacted with students, and always having a positive relationship with students.

While at Northeast, I was able to attend Manual Tech's culinary courses. This gave me the opportunity to explore my options outside of the traditional route of college education. I always talk about how this gave me an option of having a backup plan if I decided not to go to college. The classes were completely free, which was a huge relief. I would recommend this program for someone considering a trade or are undecided what to do after high school.

I had so many amazing teachers and opportunities at Northeast. My teachers always inspired me to be the best version of myself. They encouraged me to carry that forward for my future students. I should always be there for them, even if I'm the only one pushing them to become the best versions of themselves, so they can succeed in life. One day, I will pass that on to my students.

Having the Northeast scholarship my freshman year helped me start my education and find my passion, and continue my dream of becoming an educator.

I'm Lisa Rojas. I knew since a young age that I wanted to be a teacher. I would line up my stuffed animals and pretend that they were my students and use my homework as their coursework. As I got older, I would ask my teachers if I could work with the younger grades or help students in my class who needed more help. At Northeast, my teachers allowed me to see what it was like to be a teacher by tutoring my friends before tests. They taught me the hard-hitting truths that come with teaching and allowed me to experiment with what I wanted to teach when I got older.

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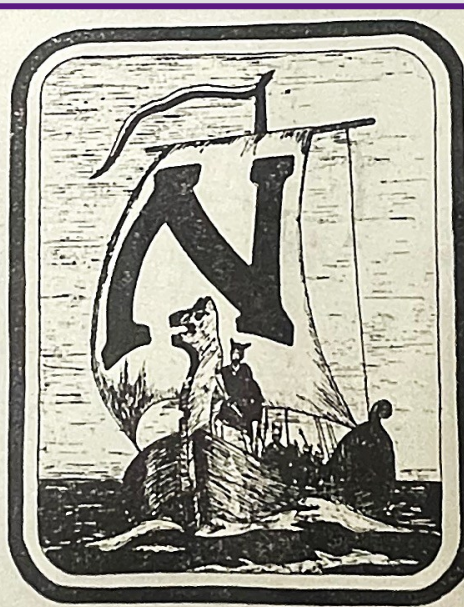
